

Call for Applications: Scholarship – Academic Year 2026/2027

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ART. 1 LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

ERDIS (Regional Authority for the Right to Higher Education) of the Marche Region is launching a call for applications for scholarships for the 2026/2027 academic year in accordance with the following provisions:

- a) Prime Ministerial Decree 09/04/2001 "Provisions for equality of treatment on the right to university studies issued pursuant to Article 4 of Law no. 390 of 2 December 1991;
- b) Legislative Decree No. 68 of 29 March 2012, 'Revision of the legislation of principle on the right to study and the optimisation of legally recognised university colleges, in implementation of the delegation envisaged by Article 5(1)(a), second sentence, and d), of Law no. 240 of 30 December 2010, and in accordance with the principles and guiding criteria set out in paragraphs 3(f) and 6. (12G0088)"
- c) Law No. 508 of December 1999, "Reform of the Academies of Fine Arts, the National Academy of Dance, the National Academy of Dramatic Art, the Higher Institutes for the Creative Arts, the Conservatoires of Music and the Equivalent Music Institutes";

- kk) Legislative Decree No. 62 of 2024, in particular Article 4, which updated the terminology relating to disability, with a view to respecting the rights and dignity of people with disabilities.

ART. 2 RECIPIENTS OF THE BENEFIT AND UNIVERSITY INSTITUTIONS

2.1 Courses for which the scholarship is awarded

Italian and foreign students who meet the academic and financial eligibility criteria set out in this call for applications and who enrol are eligible to apply for the scholarships for the 2026/2027 academic year, provided that they are studying for their first degree at each level of study:

- a) The first- and second-level degree programmes and single-cycle master’s degree programmes, in accordance with Decree 509/99, replaced by MIUR Decree No. 270 of 22 October 2004 (University of Camerino, Macerata, Urbino and the Polytechnic University of the Marche in Ancona);
- b) the first- and second-level courses provided for under the law reforming institutions for higher education in the arts and music, as set out in Law 508/1999 (ISIA of Urbino, the Academy of Fine Arts of Urbino and Macerata, the Conservatoire of Music of Pesaro and Fermo);
- c) the Poliarte courses – Polytechnic of Arts Applied to Business – as referred to in MIUR Decree No. 623/2016 and the DDPF Agreement No. 14 of 7 March 2017;
- d) the specialist degree programmes lasting at least two years, offered at the university campuses in Urbino, Macerata, Ancona and Camerino (with the exception of those in the medical field referred to in Legislative Decree No. 368 of 4 August 1999);

- e) the PhD programmes that may be established by universities pursuant to Legislative Decree No. 210 of 3 July 1998, Article 4, provided that the student is not in receipt of the scholarship referred to in Ministerial Decree No. 224/99 or any other similar grant;
- f) the Higher School for Language Mediators in Ancona, recognised by MIUR decree of 24 September 2003, and in Fermo, subject to the signing of an agreement with the Marche Region.

2.2 Choice between the final semester of the three-year bachelor's degree or the first year of the two-year master's degree

To be eligible for the scholarship for the final semester, you simply need to be enrolled for the current academic year at the time of application.

Students enrolled in the final year of their bachelor's degree, in the 2025/2026 academic year, when submitting their application for a scholarship for the 2026/2027 academic year, must choose between the final semester of their three-year bachelor's degree or the first year of a two-year master's degree.

The following are eligible to apply for a scholarship for the **first year of a two-year Master's degree**: those who complete their bachelor's degree by the date specified in the prospectuses of the universities to which they are applying, and who pre-enrol or enrol in the first year of a Master's degree programme for the 2026/2027 by the deadlines set by the individual universities.

Should the student fail to obtain their three-year degree by the date stated in the previous paragraph and enrol as an off-schedule first-year student on the three-year degree programme, they must, by 7 May 2027, submit a self-declaration certifying their academic standing as at 10 August 2026; their application will then be treated as an application for a grant for the seventh semester and, provided the necessary requirements are met, the grant will be confirmed and subsequently recalculated by a further decision.

2.3 Degree under the old system

A degree under the old system is equivalent to a master's degree and entitles the holder to apply for a scholarship, provided that the application is for the purpose of undertaking a specialisation or a PhD (MIUR Decree No. 270 of 22 October 2004).

2.4 University degrees awarded by the specialised schools of the Academy of Fine Arts and the ISIA

Under current legislation, the university diploma awarded by specialised schools within the region's higher education institutions is recognised as equivalent to a three-year degree.

2.5 Students who enrol in more than one degree programme at the same time, in accordance with Law No. 33 of 12 April 2022

A student who enrolls in two degree programmes simultaneously, in accordance with Law No. 33 of 12 April 2022, must designate one of the two enrolments as the reference for the purposes of receiving the scholarship for the entire period of simultaneous enrolment on the two degree programmes. A student who is already enrolled on a degree programme in years other than the first may not use their second enrolment as the basis for determining their entitlement to study grants. For the purposes of the increase of 20% in the scholarship amount provided for in Article 6(3) of Decree No. 1320 of 17 December 2021 of the Minister for Universities and Research, the student must continue to meet the merit requirements set out in the previously mentioned decree for both degree programmes in which they are enrolled.

ART. 3 DEADLINES FOR ENROLMENT ON INDIVIDUAL COURSES

For the 2026/2027 academic year, students must be enrolled on courses by the deadlines set out in the calls for applications published by the universities referred to in Article 2, except for students applying for the final eligible semester of the scholarship, for whom enrolment in the current academic year at the time of application is sufficient.

ART. 4 DURATION OF THE BENEFITS

The scholarship is awarded for the first successful completion of each level of the courses referred to in this article, in accordance with the following conditions:

4.1 Duration of eligibility for benefits for students enrolled on the courses referred to in the Ministerial Decree 270/2004 and PhD programmes

Courses launched in accordance with the Ministerial Decree 270/2004 by the Polytechnic University of the Marche, in Camerino, Macerata and Urbino, and by the Higher School for Language Mediators in Ancona, as referred to in the Ministerial Decree of 24 September 2003, and in Fermo, subject to the conclusion of an agreement with the Marche Region:

- a) for students enrolled on **Bachelor's degree (L)** programmes, for a period of **seven semesters**, starting from the year of initial enrolment on any university degree programme;

- b) for students enrolled on **Single-Cycle Master's Degree (LMCU)** programmes for a period equal to the **duration specified in the respective study regulations plus one semester**, starting from the year of first enrolment on any university degree programme;
- c) for students enrolled on **Master's degree (LM)** programmes for a period of **five semesters** from the year of first enrolment on any second-cycle university degree programme;
- d) for students enrolled on **PhD (DOT)** programmes, provided that the student does not receive the scholarship referred to in Ministerial Decree No. 224/1999 or any other similar grant, and to students on Specialisation (SSP) courses lasting at least two years, with the exception of those in the medical field referred to in Legislative Decree No. 368 of 4 August 1999, the benefit is granted for a period equal to the duration specified in the respective study regulations, starting from the year of first enrolment on any third-level university course;
- e) For part-time students, the benefit is granted for a period of:
 - seven years for bachelor's degree courses;
 - eleven years for five-year single-cycle master's degree programmes, or thirteen years for six-year single-cycle master's degree programmes;
 - five years for Master's degree programmes.

4.2 Duration of benefits for students enrolled on courses at the Academy of Fine Arts, ISIA and the Conservatoire

For students enrolling at ISIA, the Academy of Fine Arts in Macerata and Urbino, as well as the "G. Rossini" Conservatoire of Music in Pesaro and the "G. B. Pergolesi" Conservatoire in Fermo, the scholarship is awarded for the same period as the one established for students enrolled on courses run by the University pursuant to Ministerial Decree No. 270/04, starting from the year of their first-ever enrolment.

4.3 Duration of eligibility for benefits for students enrolled on ITS courses

For students enrolled at higher technical institutes (ITS) for the **duration specified in their respective curricula**, starting from the year of first enrolment.

4.4 Students with disabilities

For students with a disability with a degree of disability of at least 66 per cent, or for students with a disability recognised by the relevant commission in accordance with Law 104/1992, benefits are granted for the first time at each level of study as follows:

- a) Bachelor's degree – over a period of nine semesters;
- b) Master's Degree – over a period of seven semesters;
- c) Single-cycle Master's degree:
 - with a statutory term of 5 years – for a period of thirteen semesters;
 - with a statutory duration of 6 years – over a period of fifteen semesters;
- d) for students enrolled at Higher Technical Institutes (ITS), provided that the courses are structured in CFU (university credits) and the ITS Foundations have an agreement with the Marche Region regarding the DSU (right to university education), for the duration specified in the respective study regulations, starting from the year of first enrolment;
- e) For part-time students, the benefit is granted for a period of:
 - nine years for bachelor's degree programmes;
 - thirteen years for five-year single-cycle master's degree programmes, or fifteen years for six-year single-cycle master's degree programmes;
 - seven years for Master's degree programmes.

4.5 Resetting university seniority

University seniority is reset to zero on a one-off basis in the event of irrevocably withdrawing from studies in the first year. Upon being readmitted to the first year, the student is eligible to apply for the grant, provided that they have repaid any grant previously received for the same academic year and that they meet the necessary requirements.

Furthermore, credits recognised by the University from the previous course, for which the new enrolment is being finalised, cannot be taken into account for the purposes of achieving the academic merit required to retain the scholarship, nor for access to benefits in subsequent years.

Applications to reset your study career can be submitted until **18 September 2026**.

Applications for a career reset submitted after that date but no later than 21 October 2026 may be considered and therefore assessed only if there are still sufficient remaining funds available to award further scholarships; this will be done through the approval of an additional ranking list.

4.6 The calculation of semesters

Semesters are always counted from the year of first enrolment at the relevant level, regardless of the campus or the course on which the student first enrolled at any Italian university.

The 'year of first enrolment' refers to the first time a student enrolls on a course.

4.7 Suspension from studies granted by a rector's decree

Any years of suspension from studies (up to a maximum of two), granted by a rector's decree, will not be taken into account when assessing a student's merit (years of study) for the purposes of awarding benefits.

4.8 Students awarded a scholarship for the first semester beyond the standard duration of their course

Students awarded a grant **for the first semester beyond the standard duration of their course** are normally entitled to accommodation and canteen services covered by the grant for the period up to **31 March 2027**.

4.9 Students holding a bachelor's degree who enrol on a single-cycle master's degree programme

Students **who hold a bachelor's degree and enrol** on a single-cycle master's degree programme will be eligible for a scholarship covering the difference between the number of years taken to obtain their existing qualification and the number of years for which a scholarship is available on the degree programme for which the student is applying for the 2026/2027.

The scholarship can be awarded from the academic year following the number of years taken to complete their degree in their previous course.

4.10 Students enrolling on a Master's degree programme

These benefits are granted to students who meet the admission requirements for the course for which they are applying, regardless of how many years have passed since they obtained their previous qualification.

4.11 Students who obtain their qualification whilst receiving the benefits provided under the scholarship scheme.

Successful applicants who obtain their qualification whilst receiving scholarship benefits retain their entitlement to the monetary portion of the scholarship, but lose their entitlement to the associated services (canteen and accommodation).

ART. 5 SUPPLEMENTARY SCHOLARSHIPS FOR STUDENTS CURRENTLY STUDYING FOR THEIR DEGREE

Students who obtain a Bachelor's or Master's degree within the timeframe set out in the respective study regulations will receive a cash supplement equal to half the cash portion of the grant they received in their final year of study, the 2026/2027 academic year. Given the limited resources allocated to this scheme, the supplement will be awarded to students who have been awarded a scholarship (but not an additional semester scholarship) and who complete their degree in the first available examination session for the 2026/2027 academic year. For students with a disability, entitlement to the graduation award is determined by the completion of their degree within the first year of exceeding the standard duration of study.

Students who graduate particularly early – such as those who graduate in years prior to their final year of study – are also considered to have graduated in the first available session.

ERDIS will set aside a sum of Euro 90,000.00 for the award of these grants. In the event that the available funds are insufficient to cover all applications from eligible students, a single regional ranking list will be drawn up, ordered by final degree mark, (students who have passed their degree examination with a mark of 110 cum laude will be awarded an extra point) and, in the event of a tie in degree marks, in ascending order of ISEE value.

In any case, full payment of the additional grant to which the student is entitled is guaranteed, even if, given their position on the ranking list, they would otherwise receive only a partial payment due to a shortage of funds.

The supplement grant may be applied for only once during the course of study. Therefore, students who intend to enrol on a three-year bachelor's degree programme and subsequently on a master's degree programme may, at their discretion, apply for it either upon completion of their first-cycle degree (bachelor's degree) or upon completion of their second-cycle degree (master's degree).

Applications for the scholarship must be submitted by 18 December 2027 at the latest. Students must use the online form by logging into the members' area of the ERDIS website. If the form is not submitted by the deadlines specified above, the graduation award will not be granted.

Students with disabilities must also submit their applications by the aforementioned deadline of 18 December 2027 if they expect to graduate during the academic year 2026/2027 by the extraordinary session in spring 2028.

Students who are continuing their studies on a master's degree programme and who come from any university or institution outside the Marche Region must state whether they have already received a supplementary grant from their home institution whilst studying for their bachelor's degree.

ART. 6 REQUIREMENTS TO APPLY FOR A SCHOLARSHIP

Students applying for the scholarship must meet the academic and financial eligibility criteria set out in Articles 7 and 8 below of this call for applications.

ART. 7 MERIT-BASED REQUIREMENTS

7.1 General provision

Students who meet the following merit criteria are eligible to apply for the scholarship for the 2026/2027 academic year:

7.2 First-year students.

- a) **For students enrolled for the first time on the first year of bachelor's, master's and single-cycle master's degree programmes**, as referred to in Article 2 of this call for applications, the merit criteria are assessed retrospectively, that is to say, at the time of payment of the second or third instalment of the scholarship. The academic requirement for this stage is to have earned, by **10/08/2027**, at least **20 credits** (10 credits for part-time enrolment) for courses organised into several academic periods (four-month terms, semesters or modules) and at least **10 credits for other courses**.
- b) For students enrolling for the first time in the first year of ITS courses, the academic merit requirements for eligibility for the benefits are assessed retrospectively, that is, at the time the second or third instalment of the scholarship is paid; the merit requirement at this stage is to have earned, by

10 August 2027, at least 18 credits for courses organised into multiple academic terms (semesters) and at least 9 credits for other courses.

7.3 Students with disabilities

These provisions under point 7.2 do not apply to students with a disability recognised by the relevant Commission pursuant to Law 104/1992 or with a degree of disability of at least 66 per cent.

7.4 Students enrolled in the first year of master's and PhD programmes

For students enrolled in the first year of master's and PhD programmes, the required academic merit is as set out in the respective university regulations.

7.5 Students enrolled in years beyond year one

Provided that any educational requirements have been met, for students enrolled in years of study beyond the first year (the years of study must include all years from the year of first enrolment onwards up to and including the 2026/2027 academic year) the requirements to be met by 10 August 2026 are:

Students enrolling in the second year of a bachelor's degree or a single-cycle master's degree must not only have earned the credits specified in the table in order to be eligible for the scholarship, but must also have fulfilled, by the same date of 10 August 2026, any academic requirements, where applicable, at the time of admission to the course (Article 6 of MIUR Decree, no. 270/2004).

7.6 Differentiated academic requirements pursuant to the Ministerial Decree 1320/2021

Pursuant to Article 5, paragraph 12 of MUR Decree 1320/2021, the following also apply to students enrolled in years beyond the first year of the degree programmes listed below: the minimum academic merit requirements set out in Annexes A, B and C to this call for applications, which must be met by 10 August 2026. As the information obtained from the various universities indicates that the structure of the above-mentioned courses means that students may earn fewer than 60 credits, the academic requirements for students enrolled on these courses have therefore been revised in proportion to the number of credits that can actually be earned:

7.7 Assessment of academic merit for students changing degree programmes

For students enrolled in years other than the first who have transferred to a different degree programme, the **credits are valid only if recognised** for the degree programme for which the benefit is being claimed. Therefore, the credits mentioned above are valid only if they are included in the study plan for the academic year of the degree programme for which the student is applying for the scholarship.

If the transfer to a different degree programme has not been approved by the relevant university authorities by the date the application is completed, the student must declare the credits earned in their previous degree programme.

A student's ranking in the new degree programme (the programme for which the student enrolls in the 2026/2027 academic year) will be provisionally determined on the basis of the academic merit achieved in their previous degree programme.

Similarly, the academic progress of students who progress from or transfer from three-year bachelor's degree programmes to single-cycle master's degree programmes will be assessed.

The principle set out in Article 7.5 also applies to these students, namely that the duration of their studies must include all years from the year of their very first enrolment up to the 2026/2027 academic year.

7.8 Assessment of credits earned but not yet validated by 10 August 2026.

For the purposes of admission to the application selection process and the calculation of the score determining a student's position on the ranking list, credits that have not yet been validated by 10 August 2026, such as:

- credits relating to examinations taken abroad as part of international mobility programmes (e.g. Socrates/Erasmus);
- credits not yet validated due to the student's academic and administrative status still being finalised (e.g. transfer from another university);

must be declared on the scholarship application form.

All examinations/credits certified by the relevant registrar's office as having been taken by **10 August 2026** will be taken into account for the purposes of calculating the score, regardless of the date of validation.

7.9 Students who have transferred or who have applied to change study programme – declaration regarding credits recognised by the university

A student **who has transferred from another university** or who has applied to change degree programmes is required, following the decision of the relevant university body, to submit a self-certification from which the recognised credits and the year of study to which they have been admitted can be assessed.

7.10 Students (from EU and non-EU countries) who have undertaken periods of study abroad

If admitted to years beyond the first, in order to attain the required credits, these students may benefit from any recognition by university-level institutions in the Marche region of educational activities or examinations they have previously undertaken. In this case, the year of initial enrolment is adjusted proportionally to the year of study to which they have been admitted (e.g. a student admitted to the 3rd year for the 2026/2027 academic year must indicate the academic year 2024/2025 as the year of first enrolment on the online form).

7.11 Students with a disability recognised by the committee in accordance with Law 104/92 or with “a degree of disability of at least 66%”

Courses launched in accordance with the Ministerial Decree 270/04 and the law reforming institutions for higher education in the arts and music:

Full-time students:

The individualised merit requirements to be met by 10 August 2026 differ by **40%** from those set out in Article 7.5 of this document. Benefits are granted for **nine** semesters for Bachelor degree courses, for **seven** semesters for Master's degree courses and for **thirteen** or **fifteen** semesters for single-cycle Master's degree courses.

For students with disabilities, **the merit criteria set out in Article 7, point 1 and 2 of the Regional Programme for the academic year 2026/2027, for the payment of the second instalment of the scholarship and in the event of revocation or forfeiture of the benefit, do not apply.**

7.12 Differentiated academic requirements pursuant to the Ministerial Decree 1320/2021 students with a disability recognised by the commission pursuant to Law 104/92 or with “a degree of disability of not less than 66%”

Pursuant to Article 5, paragraph 12 of MUR Decree 1320/2021, for students with disabilities referred to in the previous point who are enrolled in years beyond the first year of the courses listed in the previous Article 7.6, the following also apply: the specific minimum academic merit requirements set out in Annexes A, B and C, to be met by 10 August 2026:

7.13 Organisation of annual courses

Where the course structure includes annual courses, the minimum academic merit requirements for admission are reduced by 2 credits for each such course, provided that:

- The annual course must have resulted in the awarding of at least 12 CFU, which must have been obtained during the academic year immediately preceding the year in question.

For example, for a student enrolling in the third year of the Bachelor's degree programme in Humanities who has sat an annual examination for which 12 CFU were awarded in the 2025/2026 academic year, the minimum academic merit requirement as at 10 August 2026 will be at least 78 credits (80 – 2).

7.14 Valuation of credits

The credits referred to in this article are valid only if they are recognised for the degree programme for which students are applying for the benefit, even if this is different from that of the previous year.

The limits specified for students enrolled on Master's degree programmes are increased by a number of credits equal to any credits in excess of 180 that may be recognised for the student at the time of enrolment.

Excess credits — whether earned as surplus credits or as credits outside the study plan, i.e. credits not required to obtain the degree — are not valid for the purposes of calculating academic merit.

7.15 Claiming BONUS credits

For the sole purpose of meeting the minimum merit requirements for access to the benefits referred to in the preceding paragraphs, a student may, in addition to the credits actually earned and upon express request, use a ‘BONUS’ accrued on the basis of the year of study attended, in accordance with the following procedures:

- a) **5 credits**, if used for the first time to qualify for benefits in the second academic year;

- b) **12 credits**, if used for the first time to qualify for benefits in the third academic year;
- c) **15 credits**, if used for the first time to qualify for benefits in subsequent academic years.

Students enrolled on master's degree programmes may use the bonus allowance they accrued but did not use whilst enrolled on their previous degree programme. Students who have never used any bonus points during their bachelor's degree programme may use a maximum of 15 bonus points during the second year of their master's degree programme.

The **BONUS** can only be used once and cannot be combined with other offers. Any portion of the 'Bonus' not used during the relevant academic year can be carried forward to subsequent years. (Example of a student enrolled on a first-cycle degree programme: if, in their second year, they have used 3 bonus credits out of the 5 available to meet the minimum requirement for entry to the selection process – namely 25 credits – the following year, whilst enrolled in the third year, in order to meet the minimum requirement for entry into the selection process – 80 credits – they must have earned at least 78 actual credits, to which they may add the remaining 2 unused bonus credits).

The request to use the bonus must be made when completing the scholarship application form.

This provision does not apply to students enrolled on Master's degree programmes that come under the old system.

7.16 Ex-post academic performance requirement for students enrolled in the first year of the programme

There are two deadlines for the merit assessment: the first is 10 August 2027, and the second is 30 November 2027.

- a) 10 August 2027: students who, by **10 August 2027**, have earned at least 20 credits (ten credits in the case of part-time enrolment) for courses organised across multiple teaching periods (four-month terms, semesters or modules) and at least 10 credits for other courses, are entitled to receive payment of the second instalment (for those enrolled on master's degree programmes or second-level diplomas) or the third instalment (students enrolled on bachelor's degree programmes or first-level diplomas and single-cycle master's degree programmes) amounting to 50 per cent of the monetary value of the scholarship.

Students who fail to earn the credits set out above lose their entitlement to receive the cash instalments described above.

- b) 30 November 2027: students who, by **30 November 2027**, have earned at least twenty credits (ten credits in the case of part-time enrolment), for programmes organised across multiple academic terms and at least ten credits for other programmes, recognised for the degree programme in which students are enrolled in the year the scholarship is awarded or for the programme in which they enrol in the following year – even if different from the previous one – shall retain their scholarship for the academic year 2026/2027, including the first instalment of the cash payment.

The scholarship will be withdrawn if the student does not obtain the credits specified above by the aforementioned date of 30 November. In that case, the student must repay the cash equivalent of the services used and the sums of money received, in accordance with the procedures set out in Article 22 of this notice.

Bonuses cannot be used to meet the limits set out in points (a) and (b) above.

In the event of the following exceptional circumstances, the deadline for achieving the academic merit referred to in point (b), which is required to retain the scholarship, may be extended by four months:

- a) tragic events affecting members of the declared family household;
- b) the scholarship applicant's hospitalisation for at least ten days;
- c) the birth of a child;
- d) events classified as natural disasters;

The duly substantiated application for an extension must be submitted, or will otherwise be excluded, before the deadline set for achieving the criteria specified in the call for applications (30 November 2027).

If the request is granted, the student must self-certify that they have met the requirements within 15 days of the expiry date of the extension granted, failing which they will forfeit the benefit.

7.17 Failure to meet the academic requirements by 30 November 2027 as set out for the retention of the scholarship awarded to students enrolled in the first year of the course

Students who have been awarded a scholarship who do not meet the academic merit requirement by 30 November 2027 will have their scholarship withdrawn; These students are required to:

- a) repay any sums received;
- b) reimburse the monetary value of the services used in accordance with the rates set out in Article 11 of the Annual Regional Programme for the right to university education for the academic year 2026/2027 in accordance with the procedures set out in Article 22 of this call for applications.

The amounts to be refunded will be set out in the relevant payment notices, which will be sent to the students concerned.

The reimbursement, as set out in the revocation order, must be made in accordance with the procedures specified in that order.

The Authority will forward the notification of the revocation of the scholarship to the universities referred to in Article 2 of this call for applications, so that they may take the necessary measures within their remit.

ART. 8 FINANCIAL AND ASSET REQUIREMENTS

8.1 General provision

A student's financial circumstances are determined on the basis of the Equivalent Economic Situation Indicator (ISEE) and the Equivalent Asset Situation Indicator (ISPE) for the purposes of the Right to University Education scheme, with specific reference to the student applying for the benefit, as provided for by Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159 of 5 December 2013, as subsequently amended and supplemented, and by Article 6 of the Marche Region's Annual Programme for the academic year 2026/2027. Therefore, all students must visit a CAAF office or another authorised professional to complete the Single Substitute Declaration (DSU) relating to their income for the 2024 tax year. However, the applicant is permitted to submit the DSU to INPS electronically, directly, as provided for in Article 10(6) of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/2013.

8.2 ISEE and ISPE indicators

Students who meet the following financial and asset criteria are eligible to apply for scholarships for the 2026/2027 academic year:

- ISEE up to € **24,000.00**
- ISPE up to € **50,000.00**.

The ISEE is calculated as the ratio between the ISE (Economic Situation Indicator) and the equivalence scale parameter corresponding to the specific composition of the household.

The ISPE is calculated as the ratio of the ISP (Asset Status Indicator) to the equivalence scale parameter corresponding to the specific member composition of the household.

Exceeding even just one of these values will result in disqualification.

Pursuant to Article 4(5) of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, where the applicant for the benefit was the recipient of a scholarship in the year 2024, as certified by the relevant body with a CU-2025 certificate, and solely for the purpose of verifying the eligibility criteria for the continuation of the benefit, the paying authority will deduct the amount of the grant received by the beneficiary from the ISEE value, calculated in relation to the corresponding parameter on the equivalence scale.

8.3 Definition of the household

For the purposes of awarding the scholarship, the student's household is defined in accordance with the provisions of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159 of 5 December 2013.

In the case of two (or more) students belonging to the same household who are applying for university education grants, the ISEE certificate must state: "This applies to subsidised university education grants for" followed by the tax code of all the students.

8.4 Independent student

Pursuant to Article 8 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, as subsequently amended and supplemented, a student who no longer lives with their family of origin is considered independent if both of the following conditions are met:

- a) residence outside the 'family home' of the family of origin for at least two years prior to the date of submitting the single substitute declaration (DSU) relating to the household (Article 10 of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/2013), in accommodation not owned by a member of that same family;
- b) the student's income from employment or other forms of income treated as such for tax purposes, declared for at least two years, must not be less than Euro 9,000.00 per annum, based on a one-person household.

Under Ministerial Decree No. 363 of 29 December 2015, the appropriate level of income must, in principle, relate to the individual university student. However, if the student is married, the aforementioned threshold for assessing income capacity must be evaluated also by taking into account the income of the student's spouse as well.

8.5 Non-cohabiting parents

The parents of the applicant student, even if they do not live together, form part of the same household, as defined in accordance with the provisions of Article 3(2) of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/2013,

with the exception of the cases referred to in Article 3(3), if they are married, and the cases referred to in Article 7(1), if they are not married. Where the circumstances referred to in Article 7(1)(a) and (b) apply, the ISEE shall be supplemented by an additional component, calculated on the basis of the financial circumstances of the non-cohabiting parent, in accordance with the procedures set out in Annex 2, paragraph 2, which forms an integral part of Decree No 159/2013.

8.6 Student enrolled on PhD programmes

The household of an applicant for PhD course grants consists exclusively of the applicant themselves, their spouse, children under the age of 18, and children of adult age, in accordance with the rules set out in paragraphs 2 to 5 of Article 3 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, and without prejudice to the beneficiary's right to define their household in accordance with the ordinary rules set out in Article 3 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013 (Article 8, paragraph 4, of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013).

8.7 Refugees and stateless persons

For the purposes of assessing financial circumstances, in the case of students recognised as refugees, stateless persons or, alternatively, beneficiaries of some form of 'protection' under current Italian immigration legislation, only income and assets held in Italy, if any, are taken into account in accordance with the procedures laid down in Prime Ministerial Decree 159/13; they are therefore required to submit the Single Substitute Declaration (DSU) for ISEE purposes.

8.8 The standardised indicator for students who are not resident in Italy or whose parents' household is resident abroad

Students who are **not residents in Italy** (non-EU nationals or EU nationals whose household is based abroad) and **students who are residents in Italy, who are not financially independent and whose parents' household resides abroad** must submit the necessary documentation for the calculation of the equivalent ISEEU/ISPEU, as specified in Article 11 of this call for applications.

Given that this calculation is not provided for in Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, in accordance with current legislation, the relevant department at ERDIS will calculate the ISEE applicable to international students, determining for each student the **university equivalence indicator**.

Foreign students, or Italian students who are not registered on the AIRE register, whose household does not reside in Italy and who enrol on a three-year degree programme, master's degree or single-cycle

master's degree programme must submit all the necessary documentation specified in Article 11 of this call for applications by the same deadline as the application deadline of 28 August 2026.

Students who, although they submitted their application within the deadline, have not submitted the complete set of original, legalised documents in accordance with the requirements of the call for applications by **28 August 2026**, will be excluded from the provisional scholarship ranking list.

However, their position may be reviewed once the final rankings are published, provided that the complete documentation, in accordance with the call for applications, is submitted by 18 September 2026.

Anyone who has submitted original but incomplete or incorrect documents by 18 September 2026 will also be excluded from the final rankings, but may submit further supporting documentation to supplement their previous submission by 21 October 2026. If the documentation submitted by 21 October 2026 is found to comply with the call for applications, students may be readmitted via an additional ranking list, subject to verification of eligibility and subject to the availability of any remaining funding.

Only students who enrol in the academic year 2026/2027 who submitted a valid scholarship application by 28 August 2026 and who submitted original but incomplete or incorrect documents by 18 September 2026, are permitted to submit further supporting documentation to supplement their previous submission by 31 January 2027 (the deadline for enrolment to avoid revocation of the entry visa, as set out in the MUR circular setting out the procedures for entry, residence and enrolment of international students, valid for the academic years 2026/2027 and 2027/2028).

If the documentation submitted by 31 January 2027 is found to comply with the call for applications, those students enrolled in the academic year 2026/2027 may be readmitted via an additional ranking list, subject to verification of eligibility and subject to the availability of any remaining financial resources.

Where documents are sent by post, the date stamped by the post office of dispatch will be considered as the date of submission

Any costs relating to the posting of documents, certificates or supplementary paper-based materials – whether requested or submitted voluntarily – shall be borne entirely and exclusively by the student.

Under no circumstances will the Organisation accept letters, registered post or parcels where the recipient is required to pay the postage. Any submissions made in this way will be rejected, without this constituting grounds for extending the deadlines or leading to any liability on the part of the Organisation concerning failure to participate in the procedure or the loss of benefits.

The provisions of the herein Article 8.8 also apply to Italian students who have a household, income, or real estate or movable property abroad.

8.9 Current ISEE

The ISEE may be replaced by a similar indicator, defined as ‘current ISEE’ and calculated with reference to a period closer to the date of the benefit application, provided that the conditions set out in Article 9 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, as subsequently amended and supplemented, are met, in accordance with the procedures described therein.

8.10 Changes to the ISEE during the year

In the event of changes to the composition of the household or to the household’s financial circumstances such as to render them ineligible for the benefit, or in the event of errors in the ISEE declaration used to apply for the grant, the beneficiary of the support measures is required to submit, even during the course of the year, a new Single Substitute Declaration and to notify the Authority, which will revoke the benefit should one or both ISEE indicators exceed the thresholds set out in Article 8 of this call for applications.

ART. 9 STUDENTS WITH ONE OR BOTH PARENTS WHO LOST THEIR JOBS BETWEEN JULY 2025 AND JUNE 2026

Pursuant to Article 5 of the regional programme on the right to education, adopted for the 2026/2027 academic year, a reserve of 5 per cent of the funds will be created for students from families in which one or both parents lost their jobs between July 2025 and June 2026 and remain unemployed following redundancy from a company facing economic crisis within Italy, and who are registered on the unemployment registers referred to in Law 297/2002 or under the ‘mobility’ scheme referred to in Law 223/1991 or Law 236/1993. However, these students must still meet the income/asset and merit criteria set out in Articles 7 and 8 of this call for applications. Thirty per cent of the funds will be set aside for students enrolled in the first year of bachelor’s degree, master’s degree, single-cycle master’s degree and third-level degree programmes. Should the funds be insufficient to cover all applications, two separate ranking lists will be drawn up – one for the first year and one for subsequent years – taking into account financial circumstances (ISEE) and academic merit respectively.

Students wishing to apply must submit the documentation referred to in Article 11.3(f).

Art. 10 DEADLINES AND PROCEDURES FOR SUBMITTING AN APPLICATION

10.1 Deadlines for submitting the application

All students, with the exception of those referred to in Article 10.8 (students enrolled in the open semester referred to in Legislative Decree No. 71 of 15 May 2025) must submit their application for the scholarship for the academic year 2026/2027 by 28 August 2026, failing which candidates will be excluded from the competition, in accordance with the provisions set out below.

10.2 How to submit an application

Students applying for a scholarship must hold an ISEE certificate, unless otherwise specified in Article 8 of the call for applications, in the case of Italian students or foreign students with income earned abroad. If they do not have one and the deadline is imminent, they must submit the single substitute declaration, including form MB2, electronically to an authorised CAAF or directly to INPS – Section C (university benefits) as provided for in Article 10 of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/2013. **The Single Substitute Declaration (DSU), including the section on university education grants, must be submitted in all cases by the application deadline, failing which the applicant will be excluded from the benefit (Article 11(9) of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/2013).**

Students may therefore submit a scholarship application even if they do not yet have their ISEE certificate, provided on the online application form they undertake to submit the single substitute declaration by 28 August 2026, the application deadline.

Applications to take part in the competition must be completed online only; instructions on how to access the application form will be provided on the ERDIS portal.

Applications submitted in any way other than the ones described below will not be considered.

Logging on to the website:

- **Authentication via SPID (level 2 or 3), CIE, CNS, CNS/TS**

To access the online application, you must have SPID credentials (**level 2 or level 3**), an Electronic Identity Card (CIE), a National Services Card (CNS), or a National Services Card/Health Card (CNS/TS). The electronic identity card (CIE) also allows you to log in using a smartphone or tablet via the CieID app.

The SPID required to access the online application must be Level 2 or Level 3, so as to enable “STRONG authentication”

To obtain your SPID, please visit the website www.spid.gov.it where you can find all the practical information and the list of accredited providers.

Students with SPID, CIE, CNS etc. must:

- a) complete and submit the application online by clicking the “Confirm” button by the deadline set out in the call for applications notice.
- b) must upload the documents to be attached to the application (excluding those to be submitted in original form) to the system by the deadlines set out in the competition notice.

• **Verification of identity for international students who do not hold an Italian identity document and are not resident in Italy, and for students under the age of 18:**

These students will be able to obtain the login details required to access the online application by registering via the procedure provided on the organisation’s website.

The credentials obtained will enable **WEAK authentication of the student**.

These students must:

1. complete and submit the application online.
2. upload a copy of a valid identity document via the online application process.

These students must subsequently provide ERDIS with their tax code, issued by the Italian Revenue Agency, which is required to access the services.

10.3 Student identification using weak authentication

Students with weak authentication, **who did not register the previous year**, will subsequently need to go to the student finance offices at the various campuses, bringing a valid form of identification, where they will be registered.

If students are not identified, they will not be able to access the services provided by ERDIS – whether fee-paying or free of charge – nor will they be able to receive any payments.

10.4 Amending the details provided in the application for benefits

Students may amend the details entered in their online application:

by the application deadline:

- A student who has not completed their application for financial support and has therefore not submitted it online may still be eligible to take part in the procedure.
- If, after submitting their application online, a student wishes to amend the details provided and/or any attached files, they can return to the application, which is then immediately cancelled, even if no changes have been made. Only by completing the amendments and resubmitting the application, together with the supporting documents, will it be possible to take part in the selection process.

After the deadline for applying for benefits:

- Students can change their IBAN by accessing the 'Student Portal' screen.
- Any other event occurring after the application for benefits has been submitted must be reported to ERDIS without delay by opening a ticket, and will be subject to assessment.

10.5 Other provisions

The student is personally responsible for the accuracy and completeness of the information provided. ERDIS therefore accepts no liability in the event of incorrect or incomplete documentation and is not obliged to report any discrepancies.

10.6 Local contact points for students

Students may contact any of the organisation's offices to obtain general information on calls for applications or on how to submit applications; however, to obtain more specific information regarding their particular circumstances during the academic year, they should preferably contact the following local ERDIS offices.

- **At the Ancona Regional Office** Via Oddo Di Biagio 14 – 60121 Ancona: students enrolled at the Polytechnic University of the Marche, the "Poliarte" Institute in Ancona, and the Higher School of Language Mediators in Ancona and Fermo, subject to the signing of an agreement with the Marche Region.
- **At the Camerino Regional Office** Via Le Mosse, Colle Paradiso 1 – 62032 Camerino (MC) is open to students enrolled at the University of Camerino; students enrolled on the degree programme at the Ascoli

Piceno and San Benedetto del Tronto campuses may contact the affiliated campus in Ascoli Piceno Via della Rimembranza 3 – 63100 Ascoli Piceno (AP).

- Students enrolled at the University of Macerata, the Macerata Academy of Fine Arts and the “G. B. Pergolesi” State Conservatoire of Music in Fermo may contact the **Macerata Regional Office** at Via Martiri della Libertà 15-17-19 – 62100 Macerata.
- Students enrolled at the “Carlo Bo” University of Urbino, the Urbino Academy of Fine Arts, the ISIA in Urbino and the “G. Rossini” Conservatoire in Pesaro may contact the **Urbino Regional Office** at Via V. Veneto 45 – 61029 Urbino.

10.7 Refusal to transfer an application to other bodies.

Requests from students to transfer a scholarship application submitted to organisations responsible for the right to education in other regions will not be considered.

10.8 Students enrolled in the open semester referred to in Legislative Decree No. 71 of 15 May 2025.

For students enrolled in the open semester at universities with their registered office in the Marche region which offer degree programmes falling under the Single-Cycle Master’s Degree Class in Medicina e Chirurgia (LM-41), the Single-Cycle Master’s Degree Class in Odontoiatria e Protesi Dentaria (LM-46) and the Single-Cycle Master’s Degree Class in Medicina Veterinaria (LM-42), the regulations governing admission to the courses referred to in Legislative Decree No. 71 of 15 May 2025 stems from the implementation of the various ministerial decrees issued to ensure that students can benefit from the right to education, subject to the actual funds available.

In particular, pursuant to Ministerial Decree No. 447 of 11 July 2025, students enrolled in the open semester may, whilst attending the relevant courses within that semester, avail themselves of the benefits provided to safeguard their right to education relating to accommodation and catering at reduced rates, subject to actual availability, provided that at least 51 per cent of the teaching activities in that semester are delivered in person.

For students enrolled in the open semester who subsequently enrol in the second semester at universities with their registered office in the Marche region, subject to ERDIS’s actual availability, a specific call for applications for the award of the academic year 2026/2027 scholarship will be approved by a subsequent provision, which will specify the deadline for submitting applications, the deadline for requesting a career reset as referred to in Article 4.5, and the deadline for submitting the necessary documentation.

Students will, in fact, only be able to apply for a scholarship for the academic year 2026/2027, following the publication of the specific ERDIS call for applications, the completion of the entrance examinations and actual enrolment for the second semester of the academic year 2026/2027 intake for single-cycle master's degree programmes in Medicina e Chirurgia, Odontoiatria e Protesi Dentaria, and Medicina Veterinaria taught in Italian, or for related programmes or other degree programmes at one of the universities in the Marche Region.

ART. 11 DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED TO APPLY FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

11.1 General provision

To be eligible for the benefits available for the 2026/2027 academic year, all students with assets and income generated in Italy must hold an ISEE certificate or a DSU receipt specifically for **“Right to University Education Benefits”**.

11.2 International students – Calculation of the ISEE/equivalent ISPE

For income earned abroad and assets held abroad, it is not possible to make use of the self-certification option; instead, the relevant original documentation, as described below, must be submitted.

The documentation must be issued by the competent authorities of the country in which the income was earned and each individual document must be legalised by the Italian diplomatic authority with jurisdiction over that territory.

For countries that have acceded to and ratified the Hague Convention concluded on 5 October 1961, the use of an apostille is permitted in place of legalisation by the Italian Embassy.

The documents listed above, which are drawn up in a foreign language, must be accompanied by an Italian translation certified as a true copy of the foreign-language text by the relevant Italian diplomatic or consular mission, or by an official translator.

In countries where there are particular difficulties, as documented by the local Italian Embassy, the documents listed above can be issued by the relevant foreign diplomatic or consular missions in Italy and legalised by the Prefectures.

The statement regarding difficulties certified by the Italian Embassy must relate to objective difficulties existing in the area.

The documentation must certify:

- a) the composition of the household, specifying those living with the head of the household as at the date of submission of the application.

In the event of the death of one of the parents, the date of death must be stated on the documents, or further documentation certifying the event must be attached.

In the event of the parents' separation or divorce, a certificate confirming this must be attached.

Specific documentation is also required in the event that a parent has abandoned the child or where the competent authority has ordered that the parent be removed from the family home.

- b) the income received by each member of the household, expressed in their country's currency, during the 2024 tax year; where a member aged over 18 has no income, this must be expressly stated in the documentation.

If there are difficulties in providing evidence of this lack of income, supporting documentation must be submitted, such as, for example, a certificate confirming unemployment status, employment as a domestic worker (housekeeper) or student status;

- c) a description of all the property owned by each member of the household as at 31 December 2024, stating the value determined in accordance with paragraph 3 of Article 5 of Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159/13; where no assets are held by any member aged over 18, this must be expressly stated in the documentation;

- d) a description of the movable assets comprising the items specified in Article 5(4) of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/13, held abroad as at 31 December 2024, or the average annual value of each member of the household's assets for that year. Documents relating to movable assets issued by banks and similar institutions are exempt from legalisation by the Italian diplomatic authority with jurisdiction over the relevant territory, subject to the requirement that they be translated into Italian in a manner faithful to the original foreign text and certified by an official translator;

- e) a photocopy of the residence permit, for the academic year 2026/2027, issued by the relevant public security authority. A copy of the residence permit may be submitted at a later date, provided this is done by 3 May 2027, but in this case the benefits will be granted subject to conditions and any payments will be suspended until the document has actually been submitted. If the document is not

submitted by 31 December 2028, the student will forfeit their entitlement to any sums of money relating to the scholarship, however, the benefit may be revoked if the relevant authority fails to issue a residence permit.

Students from European Union member states must submit the relevant documentation issued by the competent authorities of the country in which the income was earned, translated into Italian, **but legalisation is not required.**

Non-European Union students from particularly poor countries as referred to in Decree No. 176 of 24 February 2026 listed in Annex D to this call for applications, must submit a certificate from the Italian diplomatic mission in their country of origin attesting that the student does not belong to a family known to have a high income and high social status. For both the ISEE and ISPE indicators, the relevant certification is set at Euro 'zero'.

For students enrolling in the first year of any degree programme, certification that the student does not belong to a family known to be of high income and high social standing can also be issued by Italian bodies authorised to provide guarantees of financial coverage, in accordance with the current regulations governing the enrolment of foreign students at Italian universities. In such cases, the body issuing this certificate undertakes to repay any grant on behalf of the student, should it be revoked.

For the purposes of assessing financial circumstances, for **students recognised as refugees, stateless persons or, alternatively** holders of some form of 'protection', within the meaning of current Italian immigration legislation, only income and assets held in Italy, if any, are taken into account in accordance with the procedures laid down in Prime Ministerial Decree 159/13; they are therefore required to submit a Single Substitute Declaration (DSU) for ISEE purposes.

These students must attach to their application **a copy of the certificate confirming their status.**

The provisions of Article 11.2(a), (b), (c) and (d) also apply to all Italian and foreign students who have a household, income, or immovable or movable assets abroad.

11.3 Other documentation

Students who meet any of the criteria described below must provide:

a) Rental agreement

Students living off campus, who are scholarship recipients, and who are not accommodated in the Organisation's halls of residence due to **a lack of available places or because they are attending**

courses at branch campuses where the Organisation does not provide accommodation, must, by **13 November 2026**, submit a copy of their tenancy agreement, registered with the Revenue Agency, entered into with the landlord for a period of at least 10 months, **relating to the academic year for which the scholarship is being applied for** (from the start of the academic year until September 2027). In order to receive payment of the accommodation component of the grant, the accommodation must be situated in the municipality where the student is attending university or in a neighbouring municipality. For scholarship recipients from the last semester, the period may not be less than 5 months; in such cases, payment will be made for the months of the contract falling within the 2026/2027 academic year (start of service – March 2027).

The tenancy agreement may commence in September 2026.

The competent manager may, by means of a specific decision, set different deadlines from those indicated above, in light of any specific circumstances that may arise in the various local areas.

With reference to the definition set out in Article 4(8)(c) of the Prime Ministerial Decree of 9 April 2001, as incorporated into the Annual Regional Programme on the DSU, in any event, the submission of contracts with a duration of less than ten months – even where this is due to late eligibility for the benefit resulting from the late submission of the necessary documentation – will make it impossible to settle and pay the accommodation component of the scholarship.

Away-from-home **students** who are scholarship recipients, **with pre-school-aged children** who cannot be accommodated in the facilities managed by the University, can apply to have their accommodation allowance paid out in cash, provided they submit a valid tenancy agreement, registered with the Revenue Agency and entered into with the landlord for a period of at least 10 months in the municipalities considered to be the University's location or neighbouring municipalities, by 13 November 2026.

b) Passport photo

Students must attach a recent digital passport-sized photograph to their online application, which must comply with the formal requirements set out in Note No. 400/A/2005/1501/P/23.13.27 issued by the Department of Public Security.

c) Student with a disability

Students with a disability must attach a copy of the **certificate (by uploading it when submitting their online application) attesting to a degree of disability** of at least 66% **or recognition of**

disability status pursuant to Law No. 104/1992, if they have not already submitted this in previous years or if there has been a change in the degree of disability. To apply for the supplementary grant (Art. 12.8), students must, by 11 December 2026, submit the tax documents proving the expenditure incurred.

d) **Medical certificate (required only for students staying in ERDIS accommodation)**

To gain access to the accommodation provided under the calls for applications, students must submit a medical certificate issued no more than 15 days previously, confirming that the student does not have any symptoms associated with infectious diseases or conditions that could otherwise pose a risk to communal living.

Students will not be admitted to the accommodation facilities and will therefore not be able to take up their bed unless they have submitted the aforementioned certificate.

e) **Identity document**

Students who do not hold an Italian identity document and are not resident in Italy, and also students who are under 18, must submit a valid identity document (by uploading it via the online application procedure) .

f) **Students with one or both parents who were made redundant between July 2025 and June 2026**

Students from families in which one or both parents lost their jobs between July 2025 and June 2026 and remain unemployed following redundancy from a company facing economic difficulties in Italy, must provide documentation showing such case (redundancy notice).

The required documentation must be submitted by uploading it via the online application procedure by the application deadline. If the documentation is submitted late or is incomplete, the student **will not** be placed on the reserved list but on the general scholarship ranking list.

g) **Supplement to the scholarship for timely completion of a degree**

Students wishing to apply for the **additional amount** to the scholarship must, by **18 December 2027** at the latest, submit the application referred to in Article 5 of this call for applications. Students must use the online form by logging into the members' area of the ERDIS website.

h) **Medical certificate for students applying to receive a cash alternative to the canteen service**

Students who, for health reasons, wish to apply for a cash alternative to the canteen service must, by

23 October 2026, submit the relevant application as set out in Article 17.2, accompanied by a medical certificate issued by a specialist at a public healthcare facility specifying the nature of the condition; the certificate must also specify the foods that are incompatible with the condition and describe the dietary regime that the student is required to follow.

i) **Documents for additional scholarship funds to purchase teaching aids for students with disabilities**

Students with disabilities applying for the scholarship supplement referred to in Article 12.8 must submit, together with their application, tax documentation certifying the expenses incurred in the year 2026, by **11 December 2026**.

11.4 Return of original documents submitted

The original documents submitted must be retained on file. They may be returned at the student's express request, provided that they withdraw their application and thereby forfeit the benefit.

11.5 Correctness and completeness of the documentation submitted

Students are responsible for ensuring that the documents submitted are complete and that they comply with the provisions set out in the call for applications and in the legislation governing the right to university education.

ERDIS reserves the right to check the documentation submitted by candidates at any time and to request further documents in addition to those specified.

ART. 12 THE AMOUNT OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS

The amount of the scholarship is determined on the basis of the Equivalent Economic Status indicator (ISEE) and the student's status as 'on campus', 'commuter' or 'off campus'.

12.1 Types of students targeted by the initiatives

Each student is assigned a campus status, based on the distance between their place of residence and the university campus where they are studying. In cases where students are enrolled on a degree programme at a branch campus of a university, classification is determined by taking into account the distance between their municipality of residence and the actual location where the courses are held.

1. **On-campus students:** students residing in the municipality where the degree programme they are attending is based are considered to be on-campus students;
2. **commuting students:** students are considered to be commuters if they live in a municipality from which they can travel daily to the campus where they are studying, and if the journey can be made by public transport, **in up to 60 minutes. For each of the university campuses, the local authorities are listed in Annex (e) to this call for applications;**
3. **students living off campus:** Students are considered to be living off campus if they reside in a municipality situated at a distance from the location of the course they are attending, and the journey between their home and the course location takes more than 60 minutes by public transport; for this reason, they take up paid accommodation near the course location, either in the organisation's residential facilities or in other accommodation provided by public bodies or private individuals for a period of at least ten months **relating to the academic year for which the scholarship is being applied for.** Any estimation of journey times using private transport is therefore excluded. Students residing in municipalities not covered by the two categories mentioned above are therefore to be regarded as students living off campus.

Where a student residing some distance from the course venue takes up accommodation near that venue **free of charge** for a period of at least 10 months, they are considered a **commuting student**. To this end the student must state on their scholarship application the name of the person hosting them, who must be resident in one of the municipalities where the universities are located, their address and the period of their stay (which must be at least ten months). The Authority may request appropriate documentation to prove the accuracy of the declaration.

Foreign students are, in any case, considered **off-campus students**, regardless of where they live in Italy, unless the student's household resides in Italy.

12.2 Scholarship amounts for the 2026/2027 academic year

Pursuant to Mur Decree No. 175 of 10 February 2026, the following scholarship amounts have been set for the 2026/2027 academic year:

- Off-campus students and independent students (Article 8.4 of this call for applications) € 7,171.11
- **Commuter** students € 4,190.71
- students **on campus** € 2,890.16
- Students enrolled on **distance-learning courses** who are serving a prison sentence €2,890.16

Students admitted to PhD programmes are awarded the 'away from home' scholarship regardless of where they come from.

12.3 Amount of scholarships for the further semester

The scholarships awarded for the first semester beyond the standard duration of the courses established pursuant to Ministerial Decree 270/04 and Law 508/1999 and subsequent amendments and additions, shall be **equal to half the grant** provided for on the basis of the beneficiary student's individual circumstances; the services, accommodation and canteen facilities provided will normally be available from the start of university lectures until **31 March 2027**.

12.4 Increase in student scholarship amounts for those with an ISEE of 50 per cent or less of the maximum threshold

For students with an ISEE score less than or equal to half the maximum reference limit set out in Article 8.2, the amount of the scholarship to which they are entitled is increased by 15 per cent.

12.5 Increase in scholarship amount for female students enrolled on STEM courses

In order to further promote women's access to higher education in scientific subjects and to reduce the so-called 'gender gap' in this field, for female students enrolled on degree programmes in STEM subjects (Science, technology, engineering and mathematics) the amount of the scholarship awarded is increased by 20 per cent. For STEM degree programmes, please refer to the table published in the Ustat open-data section at the following link: <http://dati.ustat.miur.it/dataset/dati-per-bilancio-di-genere/resource/3f52db2f-24ce-4605-8e51-5618cc4ff4e3>

The 20 per cent increase in the scholarship for female STEM students cannot be combined with the 15 per cent increase provided for students with an ISEE level below 50 per cent of the maximum reference threshold; therefore, the increase is calculated on the basis of the value of the scholarship to which the student is entitled as a student enrolled on STEM courses.

12.6 Increase in scholarships for students enrolled on two courses at the same time

Students enrolled on two degree programmes at the same time are eligible to receive and retain a scholarship with a 20 per cent increase, provided they meet and continue to meet the merit criteria set out in Ministerial Decree No. 1320/2021 for the entire duration of the programmes. The increase shall not be

payable if the student ceases to meet the eligibility criteria for the grant in relation to the degree programme to which the student has linked the aforementioned increase.

12.7 Reduction in scholarship amounts based on ISEE value

Pursuant to Article 5(1) of the Marche Region's Three-Year Plan, the amounts set out above are reduced in accordance with the services provided by the Authority, as set out below:

- a) "Off-campus" and independent students: it is reduced by Euro 2,821.00 per annum, for a period of ten months for the accommodation service, and by Euro 2,011.00 per annum for two meals a day (lunch and dinner);
- b) "Commuter": the allowance is reduced by Euro 1,005.50 per year for one meal a day.

The grant will be paid in full to students whose household's equivalent economic status indicator falls between 50 per cent and two-thirds of the maximum reference threshold.

For amounts above this figure, up to the aforementioned limit, the grant is gradually reduced to half the minimum amount, whilst ensuring that the cash component is no less than Euro 839.00 (Euro 419.50 in the case of part-time enrolment), for students living away from home who are provided with free accommodation and two meals a day, and Euro 839.00 (419.50 in the case of part-time enrolment) for commuting students who are provided with one free meal per day.

The amounts of the scholarships are set out in detail in Annex F to this call for applications.

12.8 Supplementary grant for students with a disability recognised by the committee in accordance with Law 104/92 or “disability of not less than 66 per cent”

ERDIS will set aside a fund of no more than Euro 15,000.00 to enable the purchase of prosthetics and aids, as well as to carry out any other measures that facilitate the participation of students with disabilities in teaching activities and their studies.

No grants will be awarded for the purchase of the same teaching aids and materials that were reimbursed in previous years. A reimbursement may be granted for the same material or medium if the student can demonstrate that the item for which a reimbursement has already been granted can no longer be restored or used.

The student must submit **a specific application using the form provided by 11 December 2026** , accompanied by tax documents certifying the expenses incurred in 2026.

Each student may be awarded a grant of up to Euro 2,000.00.

In the event that the available funding is insufficient to provide grants to all eligible students, a single ranking list will be drawn up for students from all higher education institutions, ordered in ascending order based on their ISEE score.

Should any funds remain after the grant has been awarded to students who submitted their applications by the deadline, further applications may be considered and, where appropriate, approved in the order in which they were received.

12.9 Review of scholarship amount

A student receiving a reduced-rate grant may apply for an increase in the amount if their financial circumstances have deteriorated since their initial declaration. The application for a review, accompanied by the relevant supporting documentation, must be submitted without fail within the relevant academic year. The application will be granted provided that there are still cash payments outstanding to the beneficiary and subject to the financial resources available to ERDIS.

12.10 Withdrawing from the accommodation service

In the event that a student living away from home, when completing the application, declines a place in accommodation managed by the Organisation, or – having requested it – expressly declines it before the final rankings are approved (scheduled for mid-October – see Article 15.3 Final Rankings), the portion of

the scholarship relating to accommodation for the student who has declined the offer will be allocated to fund other scholarships for the same academic year.

ART. 13 ALLOCATION OF FUNDS FOR THE AWARDING OF SCHOLARSHIPS

13.1 Funds allocated for the preparation of the budget

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of the budget set out in subsequent ERDIS documents.

The following organisations are contributing to the funding of this call for applications:

- revenue from the regional tax for the right to education and the professional qualification fee;
- the State Supplementary Fund;
- The European Social Fund Plus and revolving fund;
- the Marche Region's own resources;
- any further additional resources under the National Recovery and Resilience Plan, Mission 4, Component 1, Investment 1.7 'Scholarships for university access' – funded by the European Union – NextGenerationEU.
- Any other ERDIS funds.

13.2 Reserves

The following reserves have been established:

1. Euro 350,000.00 to provide supplementary funding for students taking part in international mobility programmes;
2. Euro 90,000.00 for the awarding of a supplementary grants to students currently studying for their degree (on-time graduation);
3. 5 per cent of the funds allocated for the awarding of scholarships to students from families in which one or both parents lost their jobs between July 2025 and June 2026 and remain unemployed following redundancy from an Italian company facing economic difficulties.
4. 0.2 per cent of the funds allocated for the awarding of scholarships to students enrolled on postgraduate specialisation courses lasting at least two years, excluding those in the medical field, and to students admitted to doctoral programmes who do not receive the scholarship referred to in the MURST Decree of 30 April 1999, No. 224.

5. 30% of the funds allocated for the award of scholarships to students enrolled in the first year of all first- and second-cycle degree programmes, to be distributed amongst higher education institutions in accordance with the provisions of point (a) of section 14.1 below.
6. A sum of maximum Euro 15,000.00 is set aside for the provision of grants to students with disabilities, intended for the purchase of prosthetics and assistance devices, as well as for any measures designed to facilitate their participation in learning activities and their studies.

Any unallocated funds remaining in each of the reserves referred to in points 1, 2 and 6 may be used to make up for any shortfalls in resources within those same provisions.

13.3 Catering provision for eligible students

Any amount required to cover the cost of the catering service for eligible students who do not receive a scholarship and who are enrolled in years beyond the first year of any course will be calculated and determined upon publication of the ranking lists.

13.4 Allocation of funding amongst students enrolled in years beyond the first

The remaining amount, excluding the reserves, will be allocated amongst students enrolled in years other than the first year, across all degree programmes and, within each programme, by year of study, in proportion to the number of scholarship applications received by the deadlines set out in this call for applications.

At least one scholarship will be awarded to each degree programme.

13.5 Projects funded by the ESF+ 2021/27 Regional Programme (PR) and the Revolving Fund

The source of European funding managed at regional level, as set out in the ESF+ 2021/27 Regional Programme (PR), is earmarked for the following two specific initiatives, which fall under two specific objectives of the programming document, namely:

- 1) Axis 1: OS Employment. 4 c Scholarships for technical degree courses (OS form. 4.c.1): namely, support for the right to education through financial grants to unemployed and economically inactive female students who are resident or domiciled in the Marche Region, to enable them to attend technical university degree courses (STEM) under Operational Objective 4.c (Promoting women's participation in the labour market and a better work-life balance, including access to childcare and care for those who are not self-sufficient).

- 2) Axis 4: Young People. 4 f Scholarships for tertiary education (OS form. 4.f.6): namely, support for the right to education through financial grants to unemployed and economically inactive students under the age of 36, who are resident or domiciled in the Marche Region, to enable them to attend degree courses under O.S.4.f (Promoting equal access to and completion of inclusive, high-quality education and training, particularly for disadvantaged groups, from early childhood education and care, through general and vocational education and training, up to tertiary level and adult education and learning, including by facilitating learning mobility for all and accessibility for people with disabilities).

For both categories of beneficiaries identified above, the grant co-financed by ESF+ resources may be awarded exclusively:

- to individuals whose unemployment status, as at the date of submission of the application, is certified by a regional employment centre (information available from the Labour Information System);
- to individuals for whom, on the date of submission of the application, there is no active mandatory notification;
- to individuals for whom, on the date of submission of the application, there is an active mandatory notification, but who also, at the same time, have a projected annual salary of less than Euro 8,500.00, regardless of the type and duration of the contract.

The checks described in the previous points will be carried out at the relevant regional office in a single stage before the rankings are drawn up.

Recipients of scholarships co-funded by the ESF+ may be indirectly affected by the checks that the Managing Authority, ERDIS and other implementing bodies are required to carry out to prevent conflicts of interest from arising.

The same above-mentioned rules apply to the disbursement of the Revolving Fund.

ART. 14 DRAWING UP THE RANKING LISTS

14.1 Criteria for drawing up the ranking lists

ERDIS, having quantified the financial resources to be allocated for the awarding of scholarships, will draw up the single regional ranking lists, taking into account the following criteria:

- a) for students enrolling for the first time in the first year of all degree programmes, through the approval of a single regional ranking of eligible candidates – without any distinction by degree programme – drawn up in ascending order based on the Equivalent Economic Situation Indicator; in the event of a tie in ISEE scores, priority will be given to the younger student.
- b) for students enrolled in years other than the first year of all degree programmes, through the approval of single regional merit-based rankings, arranged in descending order based on the number of credits earned and the marks achieved, utilising up to the full amount of the resources allocated for this purpose, whilst ensuring a balanced distribution of benefits across all degree programmes and by year of study, based on the number of scholarship applications received by the deadlines set out in the call for applications. In drawing up the ranking list, account is taken of the ratio between the credits earned and those required to enter the competition for scholarships for students enrolled under the new degree programme, multiplied by the ratio between the arithmetic mean of the marks for all examinations sat and the scale of 30, as recorded on 10 August of the relevant year (exams and/or assessments not marked out of thirty are excluded from the calculation of the average).
The calculation will take into account the first three decimal places, rounding up if the third decimal place is 5 or greater, or rounding down if it is less than 5. In the event of a tie, the position on the ranking list is determined in ascending order based on the ISEE. In the event of a further tie, priority will be given to the younger student. The score resulting from the calculation carried out in accordance with the procedures described above will then determine the candidate's position on the ranking list.
- c) Credits claimed using the bonus will not be taken into account when calculating the score.

14.2 Students enrolled in the first year and subsequent years of PhD and specialisation programmes

For students enrolled in the first and subsequent years of PhD programmes and specialisation courses, the scholarship is awarded via a single ranking list drawn up in ascending order based on financial circumstances (ISEE).

14.3 Students enrolled in years beyond the first year at the Conservatoire

For students enrolled in years other than the first year at the Conservatoire of Music, a single ranking list will be drawn up by degree level, without distinction by degree programme or year of study.

14.4 Importing data and ranking

For the purposes of assessing the student's income and assets, the online application procedure will retrieve data relating to the most recent valid ISEE certificate calculated for the purpose of university study grants, issued in 2026 and held in the INPS computerised records, assessed on the basis of the DSU submitted by the student by the application deadline.

Should the DSU be processed at a later date, ERDIS will retrieve the ISEE certificate from the INPS database by 5 September 2026, provided that the relevant DSUs have been signed no later than the strict deadline for the application.

The DSU valid for the right to education, calculated after 5 September 2026, and the provisional ones referred to in Article 11 Paragraph 8 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013 will be taken into account when the final rankings are approved.

Any amendments to the DSU – which is valid for the right to education – made after the application has been submitted, and in any event within the time limits set out in the competition notice, may be verified during the appeal process against the provisional rankings or during the verification stage. ERDIS accepts no liability for any failure to retrieve data from the INPS records for reasons beyond the Organisation's control.

Students are required to check that the information entered on the DSU is true and accurate.

ART. 15 PUBLICATION OF THE RANKING LISTS

15.1 Provisional rankings

The provisional rankings are drawn up on the basis of the information provided by the student when completing the application form.

As a rough guide, by 15 September 2026, following a decision by the relevant Head of Department, the provisional rankings and the corresponding list of excluded students will be approved; consequently, accommodation allocations may be made in the days immediately following this date.

The results of the application process will be announced to all interested students via a notice published on the website www.erd.it and will be available in the students' reserved area.

15.2 Requests for review and final rankings

By **the fifth day** following the date of publication on the website of the notice referred to in Article 15.1, students may submit **a request for review**, using only the online form to be made available by the institution, which students can complete by logging into their personal account.

Applications for review must be well-reasoned and substantiated. They will be declared inadmissible and therefore rejected if their content is vague, generic or difficult to understand, or if they do not contain a description of the subject matter of the request, or if the grounds for the request are missing or insufficient. They must also contain innovative elements not previously assessed by the office, or provide a detailed explanation of why the previous assessment was incorrect.

Requests for review will be granted or rejected by decision of the relevant manager. Should the appeal be upheld, the candidate's position will be determined upon approval of the final scholarship ranking list.

A student who **has submitted a request for an ISEE calculation for university benefits by the deadline for scholarship applications**, but has been excluded from the provisional ranking due to the failure to produce said data within the time limits set out in Article 11, paragraph 8 of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, may lodge an appeal to request a review of their position. Should the Institution find that the failure to provide the required data is not attributable to the student, it shall, **by the final day on which appeals may be lodged**, check the INPS database to verify the presence of the aforementioned figures; if not, it will permanently exclude the student from the scholarship for the 2026/2027 academic year.

15.3 Final rankings

Subject to the enrolment dates at the various higher education institutions referred to in Article 2 of this call for applications, the final scholarship rankings will normally be approved by the first half of October 2026.

Students will be able to check the results of the application process in their personal online account; this publication shall, for all intents and purposes, be deemed to be a 'personal' notification.

An appeal against the final rankings can be lodged with the Regional Administrative Court within 60 days of their publication, and an extraordinary appeal can be lodged with the Head of State within 120 days of the same date of publication.

For any further information, interested parties should contact the ERDIS Offices for the Right to Education.

15.4 Adjustments following the final rankings

Once the final rankings have been approved, only additions or corrections to data that result in a reduction in the amount or the loss of the benefit may be taken into account.

ART. 16 Housing Service Rankings

16.1 Places available

Scholarship-winning students living off campus are allocated available beds in the accommodation facilities managed by ERDIS at the university campuses in Ancona, Ascoli Piceno, Camerino, Fermo, Macerata, Matelica, Pesaro and Urbino.

If the number of places available at each course venue is insufficient to meet the relevant demand, the places are allocated on the basis of specific ranking lists drawn up in accordance with the criteria set out in Article 16.3.

16.2 Reserves

The following bed reserves have been set:

- a. A quota of 3 per cent of the total number of beds is reserved for students with disabilities whose condition has been recognised by the relevant Commission in accordance with Law 104/1992, or who have a degree of disability of at least 66 per cent.

This reservation applies within the limits of the maximum duration of the benefits provided for in Article 4 of this Call for Applications. These students may apply even if they are 'commuter' students.

If the number of applications exceeds the number of places available, priority will be given to students with the lowest ISEE score.

- b. A quota of 1 per cent of beds is reserved for children of Italian nationals from the Marche region living abroad (whose parents were born in a municipality in the Marche region and are currently resident abroad).
- c. A quota of 5 per cent of bed places is reserved for students from municipalities in the Marche region within the earthquake-affected area (Law No. 229 of 15 December 2016) whose homes have been

declared unfit for habitation. These students may apply even if they are classified as 'commuters' or 'on-campus' students.

d. A quota of 0.5 per cent of bed places is reserved for students enrolled on postgraduate and PhD programmes, where such programmes have been established by universities in accordance with Legislative Decree No. 210 of 3 July 1998.

e. At least 30 per cent of the beds are reserved for students enrolled in their first year of study.

The remaining places will be allocated proportionally to students enrolled in years other than the first and distributed amongst the degree programmes and, within these, amongst the years of study, in proportion to the number of scholarship applications received by the deadline set out in the relevant call for applications.

The places reserved under points (a), (b) and (c) are guaranteed regardless of whether the student is a scholarship holder. Consequently, if such students do not have a scholarship and are allocated a bed, they must pay the fees set out in Article 19.

Should the number of applications for accommodation exceed the number of places the Organisation has set aside for the cases referred to in points (a), (b) and (c), places will be allocated according to a ranking of students in ascending order of their ISEE score.

Students not in receipt of a scholarship, as referred to in points (a), (b) and (c) above, who have not submitted an ISEE or do not hold a valid ISEE, will be included in the ranking list with a notional ISEE of Euro 100,000.

16.3 Compilation of the ranking lists

If, given the number of places available, it is not possible to award the grant to all off-campus scholarship holders, separate ranking lists will be drawn up for each venue where courses are run by the various universities, in accordance with the following procedures:

a) for first-year students on all degree programmes, through the approval of the lists of successful applicants, without any distinction by degree programme, ranked in ascending order based on the Equivalent Economic Situation Indicator (ISEE); in the event of a tie in ISEE scores, priority will be given to the younger student;

b) for those enrolled in years other than the first year of all degree programmes, through the approval of merit-based rankings, arranged in descending order based on the number of credits earned and the marks achieved, subject to the balanced distribution of benefits across all degree programmes and by year of study, based on the number of scholarship applications received by the deadlines set out

in the call for applications. The ranking is determined by the ratio of credits earned to those required for entry into the application, increased by the ratio of the arithmetic mean of the marks for all examinations sat on the scale of 30, as recorded on 10 August of the reference year (exams and/or assessments not expressed out of thirty are excluded from the calculation of the average).

The calculation will take into account the first three decimal places, rounding up if the third decimal place is 5 or greater, or rounding down if it is less than 5. In the event of a tie, the position on the ranking list is determined in ascending order based on the ISEE. In the event of a further tie, priority will be given to the younger student.

The score resulting from the calculation carried out in accordance with the procedures described above will then determine the candidate's position on the ranking list.

Students enrolled in the first year and subsequent years of PhD programmes and specialisation courses are allocated accommodation using a single ranking list drawn up in ascending order based on financial circumstances (ISEE).

For students enrolled in years other than the first at the Conservatoire of Music, a single ranking list will be drawn up, with no distinction made between degree programmes or years of study.

16.4 Grounds for exclusion

The following students are excluded from the rankings:

- who have not yet reached the age of majority (18 years);
- who are enrolled on a distance-learning basis;
- who are regarded as commuters, with the exception of students entitled to the places reserved under Article 16.2(a) and (c);
- who are to be considered on-campus students, with the exception of those students entitled to the provision set out in Article 16.2(c).
- who fall under any of the grounds for exclusion from the scholarship scheme set out in Article 20 of this call for applications
- students enrolled on the open semester referred to in Legislative Decree No. 71 of 15 May 2025, with applications to be submitted by 28 August 2026.

16.5 Grounds for forfeiture

Students who, after the ranking list has been drawn up, fall foul of any of the grounds for exclusion set out in Article 20 or any of the grounds for forfeiture set out in Article 21 of this Call for Applications shall be deemed to have forfeited their entitlement to the grant.

16.6 Publication of the rankings

The provisional lists of successful applicants for free accommodation are approved alongside the lists of scholarship recipients in accordance with the timetable and procedures set out in Article 15.

The student declared an awardee must, within the strict deadline (failing which the benefit will be forfeited) of five days from the date of publication of the notice referred to in point 15.1 on the Organisation's website, must confirm acceptance of the bed by completing and submitting online the form provided for this purpose and available in their personal account.

Before acceptance, the student must pay the deposit described below.

The date of publication of the notice (referred to in Article 15.1) on the Organisation's website shall be deemed the effective date for the purposes of the time limit granted for accepting the bed and, in any event, for all other legal purposes.

The handover will then take place on the date – following acceptance – of the appointment set by ERDIS for the handover of the key.

All students must submit the following compulsory documentation upon actually moving into the accommodation on the specified date:

- a medical certificate issued no more than 15 days previously, confirming that the student does not have any symptoms associated with infectious diseases or conditions that could otherwise pose a risk to others living in close proximity; the cost of the certificate is to be borne entirely by the student.
Students will not be admitted to the accommodation facilities and will therefore not be able to take up their bed unless they have submitted the aforementioned certificate.
- Students who do not already have the amount for any security deposit paid in previous years already held on deposit with the Organisation's accounts must also submit a receipt for payment of a security deposit of Euro 150.00 to cover any damage caused to the premises and/or to items entrusted to them, for the loss of keys or failure to return them, for late or non-payment of tuition fees, or for the reimbursement of sums of money for any reason whatsoever.

Information on payment methods will be made available on the ERDIS website.

The security deposit will be refunded to those who are entitled to it and who are no longer allocated a bed, subject to the completion of the relevant online form 'Notification of permanent departure from accommodation and allocation of the security deposit', approximately in November, February and May, subject to the deduction of any sums owed by the student to the Organisation, including accommodation fees and any other outstanding debts.

Upon arrival at the accommodation, students may be asked to complete a questionnaire or triage form regarding their state of health.

Students who do not take possession of their room (by collecting their key) by the date specified in the notification sent by ERDIS will be deemed to have forfeited their place, and consequently the deposit paid will be permanently retained by the organisation.

Exceptions are made for successful applicants who, within the specified deadline (within 5 days of the date of publication of the notice referred to in point 15.1), express their interest in the accommodation, providing suitable documentation to justify their absence from the meeting on the date set by ERDIS (e.g. awaiting a visa, health reasons or force majeure).

For these students, ERDIS will set a new date for the handover of the keys, which will take place after the publication of the final ranking and within a maximum of 10 **days** from that date.

Failure to respond to the new summons or failure to attend the agreed appointment will result in the student being moved to the bottom of the ranking list as set out in Article 16.7.

16.7 Requests for review and final accommodation rankings

Students who have been excluded may submit a request for review in accordance with the time limits and procedures set out in Article 15.2 of this call for applications.

Applications for review will be granted or rejected by decision of the relevant manager, who will also take into account any waivers of the benefit. Should the appeal be upheld, the outcome will be determined upon approval of the final ranking lists.

Notice of the approval of the final rankings will be published on the ERDIS website.

The results of the procedure will be published in the students' members' area.

Within the strict deadline (failure to do so will result in forfeiture of the benefit) of five days from the date of publication of the notice on the website, students named as successful applicants following the publication of the final rankings must accept their bed allocation in accordance with the procedures described in point 16.6.

New students who have been successful will subsequently be notified of the date on which their accommodation allocation will be confirmed, which must be finalised within 10 days of the publication of the final rankings.

Any student who fails to attend the appointment within the specified time limit will be moved to the bottom of the ranking list. The Accommodation Service will notify you of the decision via an SRM ticket. Only once all the places have been filled will the remaining places be reallocated to students who have been placed on the waiting list, in order of priority.

The Accommodation Service will automatically handle both the reordering of the waiting list and any reallocation of beds.

Upon actually moving into the accommodation on the agreed date, the student must submit the same documentation as specified in Article 16.6.

16.8 Accommodation service operating periods and rules for students

The period during which the accommodation service is available begins on the date that university lectures start, or on subsequent days, depending on the needs of the various local areas.

A decision by the relevant manager will set out the timetable for the provision of the service during the academic year, taking into account any periods when certain facilities may be closed for various public holidays.

ERDIS will be able to assess which and how many halls of residence to keep open during the various holiday periods, giving priority for admission to these facilities to students whose families live abroad and to those whose homes are furthest from the university campus.

In the event of urgent requirements on the part of the Organisation, facilities may be closed during the year, necessitating the transfer of resident students to alternative accommodation.

ART. 17 SCHOLARSHIP PAYMENT METHOD

The scholarship is awarded to the successful students in the form of services and cash, in accordance with the provisions of Article 12, as follows:

17.1 Accommodation service

- a. For students living off campus who have been awarded a scholarship, accommodation will be provided for a period of 10 months, normally starting from the beginning of the academic term and

ending on 16 July 2027. The free accommodation service, for scholarship recipients in the first semester who are studying beyond the standard duration of the courses established pursuant to Ministerial Decree 270/2004 and the Law on the Reform of Institutions for Higher Education in the Arts and Music, as subsequently amended and supplemented, will be provided until March 2027, normally commencing from the start of university lectures. **Students who have been awarded a scholarship and who obtain their qualification whilst the scholarship is in force**, retain their entitlement to the monetary portion of the scholarship but lose their entitlement to the associated services (canteen and accommodation).

b. **Allocation of accommodation to students with disabilities.**

The Head of Accommodation must take into account the nature of the student's disability and, where necessary, bring the lack of suitable accommodation for students with disabilities to the attention of the organisation's governing bodies.

Before taking possession of the accommodation, a student with a disability or a member of their family must inspect it and issue a suitable declaration confirming that there are no obstacles to their occupancy of the allocated accommodation; they must also state how they intend to arrange for round-the-clock personal care, should the student be unable to manage this independently. Should they identify any factors incompatible with the person's disability which the Organisation is unable to remedy and for which it has no suitable alternative accommodation to offer, the accommodation will not be granted and the amount equivalent to the cost of the service will be paid in cash.

- c. A student who has been awarded a scholarship in the provisional ranking list and allocated accommodation, but who is subsequently **excluded from the scholarship in the final ranking list**, must vacate the bed and pay, for the period during which they used the service, the amount of the fee in accordance with the rate set out in Article 11 of the Annual Regional Programme for the Right to University Education for the academic year 2026/2027.
- d. If, at the time of accommodation allocation, a student is found to have outstanding payments – whether for accommodation fees or other reasons – their allocation will be suspended; the student may take up the accommodation once they have settled the outstanding amount, provided there are still vacant beds in the accommodation facilities. Students may not claim a refund for services not used as a result of the suspension. Students authorised by the Organisation to pay their outstanding debts in instalments are excluded from the suspension.
- e. The Organisation will **reimburse the accommodation fee** to students receiving a scholarship only if, as at **19 October 2026**, it is unable to accommodate them in its own accommodation facilities **due**

to a lack of service or a lack of available places and provided that they can demonstrate that they have secured private accommodation at their own expense for a period of at least **10 months** (5 months for scholarship recipients in their final semester). A necessary condition for reimbursement is that a request must be made to the Accommodation Service when submitting the online application, and that the tenancy agreement referred to in Article 11 “**Required documentation**” of this call for applications must be submitted.

The competent manager may specifically decide – taking into account any requirements that may arise, particularly in relation to variations in bed availability across the various regional sites – to set different deadlines from the one specified above (19 October 2026).

The accommodation fee is normally reimbursed in two instalments, unless otherwise specified by a decision of the relevant manager.

- f. Failure to request the accommodation service at the time of application will mean that no payment of the relative fee is made.

In the event that an accommodation place is renounced, the relevant fees will be used to grant scholarships to other students.

- g. Students who have been allocated a place in student accommodation are subject to the Organisation’s Regulations on University Accommodation.

17.2 The canteen service

All students who have been awarded a scholarship will be entitled to use the catering service free of charge for the entire duration of their scholarship.

Students who have been awarded a scholarship are entitled to take meals at canteens run by the Organisation or under agreement with it, normally for one year from the start of the university term (excluding periods when the service is closed), as follows:

- students living off campus: two meals a day (lunch and dinner)
- commuting students: one meal a day

The Organisation will arrange for the **reimbursement of the canteen fee** to all students receiving a scholarship and to eligible students in years other than their first, should it not be in a position to provide

this service free of charge or should it be unable to provide suitable meals for students with specific medical conditions.

In this case, the student must submit a specific application, completed on the form made available, by 23 October 2026, attaching the documentation specified in Article 11.3(h) of this call for applications.

The body responsible for examining these applications may call upon the technical support of experts who will assess whether it is possible to provide catering services to these students at the ERDIS university canteens using the current menus, making any necessary adjustments where deemed necessary.

Should the University decide to commercialise the canteen service, students will be able to use the affiliated canteens at the rates applicable to fee-paying students.

Students who have been awarded a scholarship for the next semester will be able to use the paid catering service from 1 April 2027.

17.3 Disbursement of the cash portion of the scholarship

The cash component of the scholarship, where applicable, in the amount to which the recipient is entitled, will be paid in accordance with the timetable and procedures set out below:

For students enrolled in the first year of bachelor's degree programmes, first-level diplomas or single-cycle master's degree programmes:

- (a) the first instalment of the grant, amounting to 20 per cent of the total, shall be paid within ten days of the closing date for enrolment on degree programmes and, in any event, no later than 10 November;
- (b) the second instalment of the grant, amounting to a further 30 per cent of the total, shall be paid within 60 days of the publication of the ranking lists and, in any event, no later than 31 December;
- (c) the third instalment of the grant, amounting to the remaining 50 per cent of the total, is paid upon the accumulation of at least 20 credits for courses organised into several academic periods, four-month terms, semesters or modules, and 10 credits for the others, provided these are obtained by 10 August.

For students enrolled in the first year of a Master's degree programme or second-level diploma programme, the first instalment of the grant, amounting to 50 per cent of the total, is paid within 60 days of publication of the ranking lists and, in any event, no later than 31 December, subject to meeting the financial eligibility criteria, admission to the programmes in accordance with the procedures set out in the

respective academic regulations, and the recognition of at least 150 credits; the second instalment of the grant is paid upon the accumulation of at least 20 credits, provided these are obtained by 10 August.

For students enrolled in years other than their first, the first instalment of the scholarship, amounting to 50 per cent of the total amount, will be paid by **31 December 2026** and the second instalment by 30 June 2027.

To international students from outside the European Union enrolled in the first year of their degree programme, the first instalment of the scholarship will be paid upon completion of the credits required to retain the scholarship (see Article 7 of this call for applications), except in cases where:

1. They provide an appropriate guarantee as referred to in Article 11 of this call for applications or a surety;
2. They belong to households that have submitted their tax returns to the Italian State for the 2024 tax year.

Students in their final semester will receive the amount due in a single payment, together with the first instalment.

Students awaiting validation of their exams will receive the payment, if due, in cash as a one-off payment by June 2027.

Payment and cash collection methods

The cash portion of the scholarship must be paid in one of the following ways:

1. a transfer to a current account (held with an Italian bank or a bank in a country participating in the 'SEPA' scheme) held solely or jointly in the student's name;
2. a prepaid card held in the student's name or jointly held with the student, bearing the International Bank Account Number (IBAN) linked to a credit institution in Italy or in a country participating in the 'SEPA' system.

When submitting their application, students must therefore provide the IBAN to which the payment is to be made; if they do not have an IBAN, they must notify the Organisation by 31 October 2026, using only the online procedure provided, failing which payment will be suspended.

The Organisation will pay the amount in cash using the most recent bank details (IBAN) provided by the student.

No payment may be made to a student who has not yet provided the Organisation with their tax code or, in the case of 'weak' authentication, has not identified themselves at the ERDIS counter.

ERDIS reserves the right to pay the amount to students in cash, after deducting any sums owed by the student to the organisation, including accommodation fees and any other outstanding debts.

17.4 Other provisions relating to catering and accommodation services

Withdrawal, failure to make use of the canteen and/or accommodation services, or any exclusion from these services as a result of a disciplinary measure, does not entitle the student to a cash refund of the relevant fee, nor does it allow them to transfer the right to use the service free of charge to other students.

Students who have been awarded a scholarship will not be entitled to claim any refund for unused canteen and accommodation services during periods when the university canteens and accommodation facilities are open or closed.

For scholarship recipients enrolled on dual-degree programmes who are studying abroad, the portion of the scholarship not used for services will be paid out in cash, calculated on the basis of the number of days spent abroad as certified by the higher education institutions referred to in Article 2.

ART. 18 GRANTS FOR STUDENT INTERNATIONAL MOBILITY

Students receiving a scholarship in the 2026/2027 academic year, including those enrolled on doctoral programmes, are entitled, on a one-off basis for each course and once for those enrolled on courses at higher education institutions, to a supplement to their scholarship for participation in international mobility programmes, whether under programmes promoted by the European Union or non-EU programmes.

Participation in such programmes and the period of study and/or work placement abroad must be recognised in terms of credits as part of the student's degree programme, including for the purposes of sitting the final examination.

For the purposes set out in the introduction, the Organisation shall grant scholarship holders, subject to its financial resources, a supplement to their scholarship of Euro 600.00, per month for the duration of their stay abroad, up to a maximum of ten months, subject to certification by the higher education institutions referred to in Article 2, which organise the mobility programme, regardless of the country of destination. The amount of

the grant awarded, whether drawn from European Union funds or under another bilateral agreement (including non-EU agreements), must be deducted from the supplementary payment.

The grant is payable only for the period of stay abroad funded by university institutions through a scholarship awarded for international mobility: Students who have been awarded a scholarship for the last semester and who feature on the ranking list for this scholarship will receive the supplementary payment for up to five months.

The application for the grant is submitted when completing the scholarship application form online.

In the case of participation in mobility programmes involving intakes following the first, applications may be submitted following authorisation to participate in international mobility, with no guarantee of approval by ERDIS, which, subject to any remaining funds earmarked for that programme, reserves the right to disburse the supplementary grant only after grants have been awarded to students who applied within the deadline.

In order to disburse the grant, the Authority will set aside a provision amounting to Euro 350,000.00.

Should the available funds be insufficient to provide the supplement to all eligible students, a ranking list will be drawn up in accordance with the criteria set out below:

90 per cent of the fund is allocated to students enrolled in years beyond the first, whilst the remaining 10 per cent is reserved for students enrolled in the first year of their degree programme and on PhD programmes.

A candidate's position on the ranking list is determined:

- for students enrolled in years other than the first: in descending order of the merit coefficient calculated in the final ranking for the scholarship for the academic year 2026/2027 in accordance with the criteria set out in Article 14(b) of this call for applications. In the event of a tie in merit scores, the ranking is determined in ascending order based on the ISEE. In the event of a further tie, priority will be given to the youngest student;
- For students enrolled in the first year and on PhD programmes: in ascending order based on their ISEE score. In the event of a tie, priority will be given to the younger student.

In any case, full payment of the grant to which the student is entitled is guaranteed, even if, given their position on the ranking list, they would otherwise receive only a partial payment due to a shortage of funds.

The advance may be granted up to a maximum of 70 per cent of the grant and may be paid on request before the programme begins, provided that the start date coincides with the publication of the final rankings and provided that the information required for the preparation of the provisional rankings by the universities is made available in good time.

At the end of the period of stay, the grant will be calculated on the basis of the number of days actually spent abroad, as recognised by the University or other higher education institutions.

The final instalment will be paid at the end of the academic year, subject to verification that the results set out in the mobility programme have been achieved.

Should the assessment of whether the results set out in the mobility programme have been achieved prove negative, the amount of the grant paid as an advance will be recovered.

Any student who spends less time abroad than stated must repay the amounts corresponding to the months not actually spent abroad.

Provided there are vacancies, upon their return to Italy, students taking part in international mobility programmes who hold a scholarship entitling them to accommodation in the Organisation's halls of residence are entitled to be reinstated in their accommodation, with priority over all other students.

Furthermore, scholarship recipients who meet the credit recognition requirement will, at the end of the academic year, be paid the cash equivalent of the accommodation and canteen services not used during their period abroad, calculated on the basis of the number of days on which these services were not used during the academic year 2026/2027 (for one year from the start of the services). Students living off campus are aware that approval of their application to receive payment in lieu of accommodation is conditional upon vacating any room assigned to them, free of all personal effects, before their departure.

If the student has never taken up residence in the accommodation, either before or upon returning from their stay abroad, no refund will be made unless the student spends a period of ten months abroad (five months for those awarded an additional semester), rounded up to the nearest whole month, starting from the date the facilities become available.

If a student spends less than ten months abroad and, on their return, the Organisation has been unable to secure them a place to stay, they will also be paid an amount equivalent to the difference between the number of months spent abroad and ten months.

ART. 19 FEES FOR SERVICES RESERVED FOR ELIGIBLE STUDENTS AND ACCOMMODATION FEES

Eligible students who do not receive a scholarship due to a lack of available funds are entitled to use the catering service free of charge, with the exception of first-year students, who are charged **Euro 6.50** for a full meal or **Euro 4.50** for a reduced meal.

Students not in receipt of a scholarship who are eligible for the allocation referred to in Article 16.2(a), (b) and (c), students awarded a commuter scholarship who are eligible for the allocation referred to in Article 16.2(a) and (c), as well as on-campus scholarship recipients eligible for the quota referred to in Article 16.2(c) who have been allocated a bed, shall pay the following monthly fees:

Single room	Double/triple room
Euro 330.00	Euro 300.00

ART. 20 GROUNDS FOR EXCLUSION

The following students are excluded from consideration after application:

- who do not meet the merit and income criteria set out in Articles 7 and 8 of this call for applications;
- who are not enrolled for the academic year 2026/2027 at the various higher education institutions, subject to the provisions of Article 2.2 in the case of students applying for a scholarship for their final semester;
- who hold another degree of an equivalent or higher level, obtained in Italy or abroad;
- who have been subject to disciplinary sanctions more severe than a warning, imposed by the relevant bodies of the university institutions, or other disciplinary sanctions imposed by the Organisation, whereby the student is excluded from all services for the duration of their academic career;
- who, in any of the previous years, have had their scholarship or other forms of financial support revoked on the grounds of false statements, fraud, deception, wilful misconduct or other similar reasons;
- who receive other grants or scholarships or places in halls of residence or boarding schools, including scholarships awarded by the University and those awarded to students enrolled on PhD programmes. The ban does not apply to students who have been awarded scholarships by national or foreign institutions, the purpose of which is to supplement the scholarship holders' training or research activities through periods spent abroad;

- g. who have submitted an incomplete application, one lacking certain documents or containing incorrect documents, and who, pursuant to Article 71(2) of the Presidential Decree 445/2000, have not rectified the irregularities identified ex officio which do not constitute falsehoods;
- h. who have not submitted the documentation required under Article 11 of this call for applications (foreign students);
- i. who have provided the documentation with missing legalisation by the competent authorities, as required under Article 11 of this call for applications (foreign students);
- j. who have produced false and/or forged documents in order to obtain the benefit;
- k. who have not confirmed their online application and therefore have not submitted it to the registry;
- l. who have signed the DSU for benefits under the right to education after the deadline for submitting a scholarship application;
- m. for whom it has not been possible to obtain ISEE data within the time limits laid down in Article 11(8) of Prime Ministerial Decree 159/2013, and in particular applications that refer to certificates/DSUs:
 - Not found in the INPS database;
 - Do not include the ISEE for university education grants and/or do not relate to the student applying for the benefits;
 - Not yet calculated for the purposes of determining ISEE values (certificate);
- n. who have submitted their application after the deadline set out in this call for applications;
- o. who are either behind in their studies or repeating a year;
- p. foreign nationals who do not hold a residence permit for the academic year 2026/2027;
- q. students enrolled on the open semester referred to in Legislative Decree No. 71 of 15 May 2025, with applications to be submitted by 28 August 2026.

ART. 21 GROUNDS FOR REVOCATION OR FORFEITURE

The benefit will be revoked from students who:

- a. have, during the period in which they are receiving the benefit or are eligible for it, been subject to disciplinary sanctions more severe than a warning;
- b. it emerges from the investigations carried out that they have not correctly declared the financial and asset situation of their household, which is relevant for the purposes of awarding the scholarship;

- c. are found to have transferred to another university with its registered office outside the Marche Region or to have withdrawn from their studies (before 31 August) during the 2026/2027 academic year, even if they have obtained the credits required to retain the scholarship;
- d. have applied for a leave of absence from their studies during the academic year;
- e. receive other grants or scholarships or places in halls of residence or boarding schools, including scholarships awarded by the University and those awarded to students enrolled on PhD programmes. The ban does not apply to students who have been awarded scholarships by national or foreign institutions, the purpose of which is to supplement the scholarship holders' training or research activities through periods spent abroad;
- f. as at **30 November 2027** (students enrolled in the 2026/2027 academic year) have not met the merit requirements set out in Article 7, paragraph 7.16, of this call for applications, with the exception of students with disabilities;
- g. have been expelled from the Organisation's accommodation facilities due to behaviour incompatible with communal living; in such cases, the student will not have any right to claim payment in lieu of the remaining services or the payment of any outstanding cash sums;
- h. choose to give up their scholarship;
- i. fall within one of the grounds for exclusion, following the awarding of the contract, as set out in Article 20 of this call for tenders.

ART. 22 FEES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE RECOVERY OF SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOLLOWING A DECISION TO REVOKE THE SCHOLARSHIP

Students who are subject to a revocation order – without prejudice, in any event, to the application of criminal law provisions for acts constituting criminal offences, where provided for by current legislation – must:

1. repay any sums received;
2. reimburse the monetary value of the services used, calculated in accordance with the rates set out in Article 11 of the Annual Regional Programme for the Right to University Education for the academic year 2026/2027;
3. settle their student fee arrangements with their university.

Payment of the sums may be made in accordance with the procedures and within the time limits set out in the revocation decision.

Upon request by the person concerned, the Authority will allow the amounts due to be paid in instalments, up to a maximum of 24 monthly instalments, each of which is normally not less than Euro 100.00.

If the amount exceeds Euro 5,000.00, a greater number of instalments may be permitted.

Instalments are due on the last day of the month, starting from the month in which the application for payment by instalments was made. Failure to pay six consecutive instalments will result in the loss of the right to pay in instalments and the obligation to pay the remaining amount immediately in a single lump sum.

The scholarship will not be revoked and any sums already paid out will not be recovered if the student has died before 30 November 2027.

ART. 23 ASSESSMENT OF FINANCIAL CIRCUMSTANCES, MERIT AND ADMINISTRATIVE SANCTIONS

23.1 Assessments of financial circumstances

Pursuant to Article 10, point 3, paragraph 4, of the Three-Year Plan (Resolution No. 60 of 3 October 2023), ERDIS carries out checks on the accuracy of the declarations made by students regarding their financial circumstances and the composition of their household, in accordance with the criteria and procedures laid down in the Regulations approved by a resolution of the ERDIS Board of Directors at its meeting on 24 June 2019.

23.2 Conclusion of the verification

Upon completion of the verification, in cases where a discrepancy is found between the income declared for tax purposes or other ISEE components – including those relating to assets – and the information provided in the single substitute declaration for ISEE purposes, resulting in the withdrawal or reduction of the benefit, the following measures shall be taken by means of an administrative order:

- a. a reassessment of the amount of the benefit in the event that the checks reveal minor discrepancies which do not affect the eligibility criteria for the measure. This means that the student is obliged to repay the difference between the amount paid out and the amount actually due, in respect of both the monetary component and the ancillary services;
- b. the withdrawal of the grant should it be established and confirmed that the student's ISEE or ISPE figures are incompatible with the awarding of the grant. In such cases, the student – who is immediately

disqualified from the benefit and loses the right to receive further payments for the entire duration of their course of study – must return the sums received and reimburse the monetary value of the services used, calculated in accordance with the applicable rates set out in Article 11 of the Annual Regional Programme for the Right to University Education for the academic year 2026/2027.

The student will also be subject to the penalties set out in Article 10 of Legislative Decree No. 68/2012, consisting of the payment of a sum equal to three times the amount received or the value of the services unduly used, without prejudice, in any event, to the application of the penalty referred to in Article 38(3) of Legislative Decree No. 78 of 31 May 2010, converted with amendments by Law No. 122/2010, as well as the criminal provisions relating to acts constituting offences.

23.3 Investigations into the merits of the case

ERDIS verifies eligibility by accessing the universities' Student Registry databases electronically, where such access is available, and/or by requesting information from the administrative offices of the universities.

In order to ensure compliance with the deadlines set out in the call for tenders for the award of services, checks and verifications regarding the accuracy of students' self-declarations may also be carried out after the benefits have been paid out.

The relevant Head of Department shall decide to revoke or reassess the amount of the scholarship in the following cases:

- failure to meet the eligibility criteria required to qualify for the benefit;
- the student is enrolled on a degree programme that is different from, and/or at a different level to, the one indicated in the application; this provision applies where the indication of a different degree programme has resulted in the awarding of a scholarship which the student, had they made truthful declarations, would not otherwise have received (due to lack of merit, lack of funds, etc.). The value of the benefit will be recalculated if the assessed eligibility criteria show entitlement to a benefit of a lower amount than the one received.

The student will be required to reimburse the cost of the services received without authorisation, in accordance with the procedures set out in Article 22.

Notification of the scholarship revocation will be forwarded to the relevant academic authorities so that appropriate action can be taken regarding the payment of fees.

ART. 24 NOTICES TO STUDENTS

All communications relating to this procedure (notices and general and individual information, as well as communications concerning the right of access to documents) will be carried out exclusively via the **SRM TICKET – Student Relationship Management** application, which can be accessed via the student's personal area on the website www.erdis.it.

The use of this platform is the only official channel of communication. Candidates are therefore required to:

- log in to the application regularly to check for updates;
- check that tickets and the associated notifications are received correctly.

The publication of notices or the sending of communications via the **SRM TICKET** system constitutes official notification for all intents and purposes; the Administration shall not be held liable for any failure on the part of the candidate to read such communications, provided that the communication has been correctly sent by the system.

ART. 25 INFORMATION PURSUANT TO ART. 13 OF EU REGULATION 2016/679

The General Data Protection Regulation (EU Regulation 2016/679 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 27 April 2016) hereinafter also referred to as 'GDPR' on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data, provides for the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data as a fundamental right.

Categories of data for the evaluation of the economic requirements: in accordance with Article 14 of the GDPR, we inform you that for the purposes indicated under letters a) and c) below, in order to evaluate the possession of the necessary economic requirements, ERDIS will have to acquire the ISEU value, the composition of the family unit, as well as all the information provided in the DSU, provided that it is relevant and not excessive for the said purpose, directly from the INPS database in application of the Prime Ministerial Decree No. 159 of 5 December 2013.

For the purposes of processing set out below, in specific situations, **special categories of data** (Article 9 of the GDPR) may be collected and processed, such as: racial or ethnic origin (for non-EU citizens and for refugee

status); health status (in the case of pregnancy or for students with disabilities); criminal records (for users and students who are prisoners); sexual life and/or sexual orientation (for any corrections to gender assignment).

Purpose and legal basis

In accordance with the principles of lawfulness, fairness, transparency, adequacy, relevance and necessity set out in Article 5(1) of the GDPR, ERDIS, in its capacity as Data Controller, will process personal data exclusively for purposes related to the performance of its institutional tasks in the public interest.

In particular, the data provided are collected and processed for the following purposes:

- a) Drawing up of the rankings for the allocation of scholarships and university accommodation as per Prime Ministerial Decree of 9 April 2001 and Legislative Decree no. 68 of 29 March 2012 and subsequent granting of the relevant benefits;
- (b) fulfilment of monitoring, evaluation and control obligations under Reg. (EU) No 2021/1060 et seq. (also with reference to what is expressly provided for in Art. 49.5) and Reg. (EU) No. 2021/1057 et seq. including the measurement of the indicators defined in Reg. (EU) No 2021/1057 and in the PR Marche ESF+ 2021/27;
- (c) provision of other contributions, facilities and services relating to the right to university study;
- (d) issue of an ERDIS identification card;
- (e) use of the ERDIS app;
- (f) statistics and historical and scientific research, based on aggregated or anonymised data, without the possibility of identifying the user.
- (g) compliance with legally binding requests to fulfil a legal obligation, regulations or court orders, as well as to defend a right in court. ERDIS may also process data to fulfil a legal obligation and/or to defend its own right in court.

The data subject's email address may be used to send additional institutional communications, which may also contain information, initiatives and opportunities promoted by other public bodies, closely linked to the right to education or otherwise deemed to be of potential interest to the student. In such cases, personal data is not disclosed or transferred to third parties: communications are sent exclusively by the Data Controller. The data subject may object at any time to receiving such additional communications by using the opt-out mechanisms provided in each communication.

Processing is carried out in accordance with Article 6, paragraph 1(e) of the GDPR, in the context of carrying out tasks in the public interest, and in accordance with Legislative Decree 196/2003, as amended by Legislative Decree 101/2018. The legal basis for the collection and processing of special categories of data is set out in Article 9 par. 2 GDPR, and in particular points (c) and (g) (protection of vital interests and grounds of substantial public interest laid down by law).

Nature of data provision

The data subject is obliged to provide the personal data requested; any refusal to do so, or any request for erasure, objection or restriction of processing, will result in exclusion from the application procedure and the inability to use the requested services, including the ERDIS apps.

Data processing modes

In relation to the above-mentioned purposes, processing may be carried out manually, with paper documents and also with the aid of electronic or otherwise automated means. Data are collected and processed in special document/server archives. ERDIS will take all necessary measures to rectify any inaccurate data in a timely manner, having regard to the purposes of the processing. Personal data are processed using appropriate technical and organisational security measures in accordance with Art. 32 of the EU Regulation so as to ensure a level of security appropriate to the risk by minimising the risks of destruction or loss, unauthorised access or processing not in accordance with the purposes of collection. Personal data are not subject to automated decision-making or profiling.

The processing and storage of personal data collected by ERDIS take place on servers located within the regional offices and/or on external servers belonging to providers of certain services necessary for technical and administrative management, who may become aware of the personal data of data subjects solely for the purposes of providing the requested service.

Recipients of personal data and possible data transfers abroad

Required recipients: The data processed for the purposes set out above will be disclosed to, or will otherwise be accessible to, employees and contractors assigned to the relevant departments at ERDIS, who, in their capacity as data protection officers, and/or system administrators, and/or data processors, will be adequately instructed by the data controller for this purpose. The data provided will be made available to the Certifying Authority and the Audit Authority for the fulfilment of their obligations under the European Regulations.

Possible recipients: ERDIS may also disclose the personal data for which it is the data controller to other public authorities where the latter need to process such data for any proceedings falling within their institutional remit, as well as to all those public bodies to which, where the relevant conditions are met, disclosure is mandatory under EU provisions, legislation or regulations, as well as to insurance companies for any accident claims. Personal data may be disclosed to the Marche Region, universities, AFAM institutions, other higher education institutions, INPS, the Inland Revenue Agency, the Ministry of Education and Merit, the Ministry of Universities and Research, the Ministry of the Interior, the Ministry of Defence, the National Association for Organisations Promoting the Right to University Education (Andisu), as well as to other public and/or private bodies for the purposes of monitoring, statistics or research, or as necessary for the issue of the ERDIS identification card.

Personal data may also be disclosed to public authorities and public or private organisations where activities required to support the provision of services may be carried out. The data provided may also be made available to the European Commission's departments and to central government bodies (e.g.: MEF-IGRUE, Anpal) and other Supervisory Authorities (e.g.: Court of Auditors, Guardia di Finanza) for the performance of their institutional functions.

External data processors: ERDIS relies on external suppliers to provide certain services necessary for technical and administrative management; these suppliers may become aware of students' personal data, solely for the purposes of providing the requested service. Said data may also be sent to regional, national and EU information systems used for the management and monitoring of projects funded by the European Social Fund Plus (ESF+). The data collected, for the pursuit of some of the institutional purposes mentioned above and in accordance with express legal provisions, may have to be transferred to a country outside the European Union (so called third country).

Personal data will not be subject to dissemination.

Personal data retention period

Personal data will be retained for as long as is necessary to administer applications and, following conclusion, for the period stipulated by current legislation on the retention of administrative records and for the purposes of the Organisation's legal defence. Other data collected in connection with the use of the services and for communications purposes will be retained for the periods specified by current legislation or by ERDIS's regulations.

Rights of the data subject

The data subject has the right to request the following from ERDIS, as the data controller, in accordance with Articles 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22 of the GDPR:

- access to their personal data and to all the information referred to in Article 15 of the GDPR;
- rectification of inaccurate personal data and the completion of incomplete data;
- erasure of their data, with the exception of data contained in records which ERDIS is required by law to retain, and unless there is an overriding legitimate ground for processing;
- restriction of processing where one of the circumstances set out in Article 18 of the GDPR applies.

They are also entitled to:

- the right to data portability in respect of their personal data;
- object to the processing of their personal data, without prejudice to the provisions regarding the necessity and mandatory nature of such processing for the purposes of establishing the relationship;

- withdraw any consent given for non-mandatory data processing, without this affecting the lawfulness of the processing based on the consent given prior to the withdrawal;
- not be subject to a decision based solely on automated processing, including profiling, which produces legal effects concerning him or significantly affects him in a similar way.

Methods for exercising rights

The data subject may exercise all the rights set out above by sending an email to the Data Protection Officer at the following email address: **dpo@erdis.it**

Complaint

The data subject also has the right to lodge a complaint with the Data Protection Authority pursuant to Article 77 of the GDPR and to request an inspection by the Authority.

ART. 26 POLICY ON CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

INTRODUCTION

The Marche Region has adopted a methodology designed to ensure effective and proportionate measures for the prevention and management of the risk of fraud and, specifically, the risk of conflicts of interest, as set out in the annex to the current SIGECO. The verification system adopted involves not only public officials, but also, indirectly, the beneficiaries/recipients of the interventions; this document is therefore intended to inform and raise awareness amongst all those involved in various capacities in operations co-financed by the European Social Fund Plus regarding their obligations to prevent and/or manage situations of conflict of interest, and regarding the checks that may affect them.

The prevention and management of conflicts of interest are, in fact, essential to avoid both financial damage to the budget of the Union, the State or the Region, and damage to their reputation resulting from a loss of confidence in the public sector's ability to operate impartially and in the general interest of society.

I. REGULATIONS

European Union regulations

The general rules on conflicts of interest are set out in Article 61 of Regulation (EU) 2024/2509 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 23 September 2024 laying down the financial rules applicable to the general

budget of the Union (and repealing Regulation (EU) 2018/1046), which lays down the financial rules applicable to the general budget of the Union.

This Article applies to all funds deriving from the EU budget and to all management modes. National authorities are, however, entitled to adopt supplementary national rules which may be even more detailed and/or stricter (see the Code of Conduct for employees of the Regional Executive, discussed below).

Article 61 of the Regulation 2024/2509;

1. Financial actors within the meaning of Chapter 4 of this Title and other persons, including national authorities at all levels, who are involved in the implementation of the budget under direct management, indirect and shared implementation of the budget, including in relation to the relevant preparatory acts, audits or controls, shall not take any action that could give rise to a conflict between their interests and those of the Union. They shall also take appropriate measures to prevent conflicts of interest from arising in the performance of the duties for which they are responsible, and to resolve situations which may objectively be perceived as giving rise to a conflict of interest.

2. Where there is a risk of a conflict of interest involving a member of staff of a national authority, the person concerned shall inform their line manager.

Where such a risk arises in relation to a member of the statutory staff, the person concerned shall inform the competent authorising officer by delegation. The relevant line manager or the authorising officer by delegation shall confirm in writing whether a conflict of interest has been established. Where a conflict of interest arises, the appointing authority or the competent national authority shall ensure that the person concerned ceases all activities in that matter. The authorising officer by delegation or the competent national authority shall ensure that any other appropriate action is taken in accordance with the applicable law.

3. For the purposes of paragraph 1, a conflict of interest exists where the impartial and objective performance of the duties of a financial actor or any other person referred to in paragraph 1 is compromised by family or emotional ties, political or national affinities, economic interests or any other direct or indirect personal interest. It is clear from the first paragraph that the scope of the provisions on conflicts of interest extends to all methods of managing EU funds and to all parties, including national authorities at all levels (and regional authorities), involved in the management of the EU budget, including the implementation of preparatory acts and audits, and the carrying out of checks.

The first paragraph also lays down the obligation for the authorities to prevent conflicts of interest from arising and to manage not only situations where there is a conflict between personal interests and those of the Union or the public, but also situations that may objectively 'be perceived' as conflicts of interest.

With regard to this latter definition, according to the Commission, a perceived conflict of interest may arise, in particular, where a person, regardless of their intentions, may reasonably be regarded as having, or be perceived as having, conflicting public and private interests which risk compromising their ability to carry out their duties and fulfil their responsibilities impartially and objectively (for example, a risk or opportunity for favouritism or hostility on the grounds of family interests and national or political affiliations may objectively be perceived as giving rise to a conflict of interest).

A perceived conflict of interest encompasses objective circumstances that affect confidence in the independence and impartiality of a person or entity, even if the conflict of interest does not materialise or even if the person does not derive any actual benefit from the situation. Ensuring effective compliance with the rules on the prevention of conflicts of interest serves precisely to dispel any doubts that a reasonable, informed, objective and bona fide person might have regarding the propriety of the conduct of a person involved in the implementation of the budget.

It should also be noted that this rule is qualified by the fact that perception is subjective, whereas the potential conflict of interest must be objective: for example, the person should actually have the power to act or issue instructions, or actually have a connection that affects their impartiality.

As regards the scope of the regulation, pursuant to Article 61(1) of the RF 2024, 'participation' includes preparatory acts and any stage of the process of planning, decision-making, management, audit and control of the use of EU funds.

This broad description encompasses expert advisory groups comprising representatives of public authorities, the private sector and/or civil society organisations, where the conflict obviously relates not to the sectoral or social interests that they officially represent within the advisory group, but to the personal interests of the individual members.

All the more so within the Managing Authority, the prevention and management of conflicts of interest applies to all staff who are directly involved in any of the stages listed above.

The third paragraph provides a broad definition of what constitutes a conflict of interest; this is set out in greater detail in the Guidelines on the prevention and management of conflicts of interest pursuant to the Financial Regulation, adopted by the Commission.

It is worth highlighting just the following points:

- Direct and indirect interests constitute a very broad category; they may also include gifts or hospitality, non-financial interests, or arise from involvement in non-governmental or political organisations (even if unpaid) and from conflicting duties of loyalty towards different parties or entities to which the person in question is bound by obligations.

- A conflict of interest is not normally deemed to exist where the tasks carried out by the person concerned in implementing the EU budget relate to decisions of a general nature, based on objective criteria that apply to an entire sector of the economy or a very broad group of potential beneficiaries, and which are therefore not influenced by personal feelings, political or national affiliations, or economic interests, nor by the fact that the person in question or a member of their family is among the beneficiaries.

The second paragraph of Article 61 provides that, where there is a conflict of interest or a situation that could be regarded as such, the person concerned is required to report this to their line manager.

Any third parties who are aware of the conflict must also report it.

The relevant line manager must confirm in writing whether a conflict of interest exists, carefully assessing whether a person aware of the relevant facts might consider that the organisation's integrity is at risk as a result of that conflict of interest.

Prior to such an assessment, and subject to the applicable law, the authority or line manager should discuss the situation with the person concerned in order to better assess whether there is a risk of bias in the performance of their duties.

The line manager assesses whether it is necessary to replace the person who has declared a potential conflict of interest; in the meantime, that person must refrain from dealing with the file or case in order to avoid creating a de facto conflict of interest.

Once the existence of a conflict of interest has been established, the competent national authority (or the appointing authority) must ensure that the member of staff concerned ceases all relevant activities relating to the implementation of the budget, including preparatory acts, as well as all activities related to the conflict of interest.

The provisions on conflicts of interest require the competent authority to take appropriate corrective measures. According to the Commission, these include the annulment and re-evaluation of procurement procedures, the annulment of contracts or agreements, the suspension of payments, the imposition of financial corrections and the recovery of funds.

Disciplinary sanctions may be imposed on the person who failed to declare the conflict of interest.

National provisions

Law No. 241/1990.

Article 6-bis. Conflict of interest

1. The person in charge of the proceedings and the heads of the offices responsible for issuing opinions, technical assessments, procedural documents and the final decision must recuse themselves in the event of a conflict of interest, and must report any such conflict, including potential conflicts.

Presidential Decree No. 62/2013

Article 6. Disclosure of financial interests and conflicts of interest

1. Without prejudice to the transparency obligations laid down by law or regulations, upon taking up a post in the office, the employee shall inform the head of the office in writing of all direct or indirect collaborative relationships with private entities, whether remunerated in any way, which the employee currently has or has had in the last three years, specifying:

(a) whether the person concerned, or their relatives or relatives by marriage up to the second degree, their spouse or cohabiting partner, still have financial dealings with the person with whom they had the aforementioned collaborative relationships;

(b) whether such relationships have existed or currently exist with persons who have an interest in activities or decisions relating to the office, limited to the cases entrusted to him.

2. Employees shall refrain from making decisions or carrying out activities relating to their duties in situations where there is a conflict of interest – even a potential one – with their own personal interests, or those of their spouse, cohabiting partner, relatives or relatives by marriage up to the second degree. The conflict may relate to interests of any kind, including non-financial ones, such as those arising from a desire to yield to political, trade union or managerial pressure.

Article 7. Obligation to abstain

1. An employee shall refrain from taking part in decision-making or activities that may involve their own interests, or those of their relatives, relatives by marriage up to the second degree, their spouse or cohabiting partners, or of persons with whom they have regular contact; or of individuals or organisations with whom they or their spouse have a pending legal dispute, a serious feud, or significant credit or debt arrangements; or of individuals or organisations for which they act as guardian, trustee, attorney-in-fact or agent; or of bodies, associations (whether or not recognised), committees, companies or establishments of which he is a director, manager or executive. An employee shall abstain in any other case where there are serious grounds of expediency. The head of the relevant department decides on the matter of abstention.

Undeclared conflicts of interest do not necessarily constitute criminal offences: under Italian criminal law, the most closely related provision is Article 323 of the Criminal Code (abuse of office), which clearly does not punish an undeclared conflict of interest but rather the act of deriving an advantage from it: Unless the act constitutes a more serious offence, a public official or a person entrusted with a public service who, in the performance of their duties or service, in breach of specific rules of conduct expressly laid down by law or by acts having the force of law and which leave no room for discretion, or by failing to recuse themselves where their own interests or those of a close relative are involved, or in other prescribed cases, intentionally procure

for themselves or for others an unjust advantage or financial gain (or cause unjust damage to others), shall be punished with imprisonment for a term of one to four years.

Regional provisions

The Code of Conduct for Employees of the Marche Region, approved by Regional Council Decision No. 872 of 9 June 2025

Article 3 – GENERAL PRINCIPLES

2. Employees shall also uphold the principles of integrity, fairness, good faith, proportionality, objectivity, transparency, equity and reasonableness, and shall act independently and impartially, recusing themselves in the event of a conflict of interest.

ART. 5 – MEMBERSHIP OF ASSOCIATIONS AND ORGANISATIONS

1. In accordance with the current regulations governing the right of association, employees must, within 15 days of joining, notify the head of their respective management unit in writing of their membership of any associations or organisations – whether confidential or not – whose areas of interest are involved in or may interfere with the conduct of the office's business.

2. For the purposes of assessing potential conflicts of interest, the employee's line manager may ask the employee to provide, in addition to the association's or organisation's articles of association, any other information that may be useful for this assessment. Should it transpire that participation in the scheme interferes with the employee's work processes, areas of responsibility and assigned objectives, the manager, having consulted the employee, shall consider assigning tasks that are more compatible or take the most appropriate organisational measures.

Art. 6 – DISCLOSURE OF FINANCIAL INTERESTS AND CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

1. Without prejudice to the transparency obligations laid down by law or regulations, upon appointment to a managerial post, the employee shall notify their line manager in writing, using the form provided by the Regional Administration, of all collaborative relationships with private entities, regardless of how they are remunerated, which they currently have or have had in the last three years, specifying:

(a) whether he or she, or his or her relatives, relatives by marriage up to the second degree, spouse or cohabiting partner, still have financial dealings with the person with whom he or she had the aforementioned collaborative relationships;

(b) whether such relationships have existed or currently exist with persons who have an interest in activities or decisions relating to the management structure to which he belongs, limited to the matters entrusted to him.

The employee also undertakes to notify the organisation promptly of any changes to the declarations already submitted.

2. In the case of a new appointment, upon signing the employment contract, the employee shall submit to the manager of the department responsible for personnel matters the declaration of financial interests and conflicts of interest referred to in paragraph 1. The aforementioned notification is forwarded by the department responsible for personnel matters to the manager of the employee's initial place of assignment, who verifies that there are no situations – including potential ones – of conflict of interest, consulting the Anti-Corruption and Transparency Officer where necessary.

3. Employees shall refrain from making decisions or carrying out activities relating to their duties in situations involving a conflict of interest – even a potential one – where their own interests, or those of their spouse, cohabiting partner, relatives or relatives by marriage up to the second degree, are involved. The conflict may relate to interests of any kind, including non-financial ones, such as those arising from a desire to yield to political, trade union or managerial pressure.

Article 7 – OBLIGATION TO ABSTAIN

1. An employee shall refrain from taking part in decision-making or activities that may in any way involve their own interests, or those of their relatives, relatives by marriage up to the second degree, their spouse or cohabiting partners, or of persons with whom they have regular contact; or of individuals or organisations with whom they or their spouse have a pending legal dispute, a serious feud, or significant credit or debt arrangements; or of individuals or organisations for whom they act as guardian, trustee, attorney-in-fact or agent; or of bodies, associations (whether or not recognised), committees, companies or establishments of which he is a director, manager or executive, or in which he holds corporate or representative positions. An employee shall abstain in any other case where there are serious grounds of expediency.

2. The employee is required to take leave until such time as the head of their respective management unit decides otherwise.

3. In the cases referred to in paragraph 1, the employee must notify in writing, within 5 working days of becoming aware of the circumstances that may give rise to a conflict of interest, their situation to the head of the management unit to which they belong, who, in order to ensure the continuity of the office's work, must reply in writing to the employee within the following 5 working days, relieving them of their duties and assigning the work to other employees or, in the absence of suitable expertise, undertake the task themselves.

4. Any employee who, in the course of their duties, becomes aware of circumstances that could give rise to a conflict of interest – even a potential one – such as to give rise to an obligation on the part of another employee to recuse themselves, shall be required to inform the manager of the employee's department without delay, so as to enable the manager to carry out the assessment referred to in the preceding paragraphs.

5. Where the head of the management structure to which the employee belongs, having received the notification, considers that there are no conflicts of interest that would trigger the obligation to recuse oneself as provided for in this article, they shall set out in writing the reasons permitting the employee in question to carry out the task in any event and shall notify the employee of these reasons by means of a specific communication, taking care also to inform the Office for Disciplinary Proceedings and Anti-Corruption and Transparency Officer of the outcome of the assessment carried out.

6. Where the dispute involves a member of the Regional Executive, it is the responsibility of the senior manager to assess what action should be taken. Where the conflict concerns the Secretary-General of the Regional Executive, it is the responsibility of the Deputy Secretary to assess the action to be taken, after consulting the relevant Anti-Corruption and Transparency Officer to determine whether a conflict of interest exists.

Article 17 – SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR MANAGERS

2. Before taking up the duties associated with the post to which they have been appointed, the senior manager must notify the Secretary-General and the head of the regional department responsible for personnel matters of any shareholdings and other financial interests that may place them in a conflict of interest with the public office they hold, and must declare whether they have relatives or relatives by marriage up to the second degree, a spouse or cohabiting partner who are engaged in political, professional or economic activities that bring them into frequent contact with the office they are to head, or who are involved in decisions and activities relating to that office. They must provide information on their financial circumstances and submit the annual income tax returns required by law for personal income tax, using the form provided by the authorities.

II. OPERATING PROCEDURE

Every employee and any external contractor must complete the declaration set out in Annex 1 to the guidelines to SIGECO for the purposes of conflict of interest checks and sign this notice to confirm that they have read it. It should be noted that the declaration of no conflict of interest reflects the employee's personal circumstances at the time the declaration is made; therefore, the declaration will be considered valid until such time as the employee reports the existence of a conflict of interest, even if only potential.

Should an employee consider that a conflict of interest may exist (or arise in the course of their duties), they are required to act in accordance with the provisions of Article 7 of the Code of Conduct set out above, and therefore to refrain from participating in decision-making or activities that may in any way involve their own interests or those of their relatives and relatives by marriage, and to report this promptly to the manager in charge of the relevant department/line manager/Client (in the case of external consultants), who shall assess the report in writing, following consultation with the person concerned.

From the moment the report is made until the outcome of the written assessment by the Manager/line manager/Client, the employee shall, as a precautionary measure, refrain from carrying out any further office or service-related activities connected with the conflict of interest that is the subject of the report.

Should the conflict be confirmed by the manager in charge of the assigned unit, the line manager or the client, the person making the declaration must be replaced for the activities in respect of which the conflict arises.

III. CHECKS ON THE DECLARATION

Declarations of no conflict of interest are duly recorded in the SIFORM2 information system and are subject to random checks, except for those issued by members of tender committees, which are checked in full.

The checks will be carried out using the following tools:

- ARACHNE platform;
- PIAF IT Platform (Integrated Anti-Fraud Platform);
- TELEMACO;
- PERLAPA database;
- Database of Local and Regional Administrators;
- institutional website, 'Transparent Administration' section, 'Holders of collaborative or consultancy posts' sub-section;
- ANAC's National Public Contracts Database;
- JOBAGENCY regional employment information system;
- web search engines (e.g. Google).

IV. CONSEQUENCES IN THE EVENT OF A FALSE DECLARATION

If it is established that the declaration contains false information, the declarant may:

- be subject to the criminal penalties referred to in Article 76 of Presidential Decree No. 445 of 28 December 2000;
- be subject to the disciplinary sanctions provided for in the employment contract or in the contract governing external consultancy;
- render the activity carried out irregular, with financial consequences for that activity as well.

Indeed, failure to comply with the rules on conflicts of interest may result in the imposition of financial corrections and the recovery of funds, as provided for in the relevant sector-specific rules and/or other forms of corrective measures. Finally, it should be noted that a conflict of interest which is objectively perceived and remains unresolved (i.e. for which the procedure set out in point 4 of this note has not been followed) constitutes an irregularity.

ART. 27 PERSON IN CHARGE OF THE PROCEDURE

The officials in charge of the scholarship awarding procedure are managers holding “Right to Study” I.E.Q. status, each according to the relevant areas.

ART. 28 REFERRAL RULE

Insofar as matters are not expressly provided for in this document, reference is made to the Regional Plan for the Right to Education for the three-year period 2023 – 2026, approved by Resolution No. 60 of 3 October 2023 of the Marche Regional Council, and to the resolution of the Marche Regional Executive No. 872 of 6 July 2026 approving the Regional Programme for the Right to University Education for the academic year 2026/2027, Regional Law No. 4 of 20 February 2017, Legislative Decree No. 68 of 29 March 2012, and the Prime Ministerial Decree of 9 April 2001 ‘Equal treatment regarding the right to university education’, Ministerial Decree No. 1320 of 17 December 2021 and the MUR Circular No. 13676 of 11 May 2022.

In the event that regional or state measures are subsequently approved that establish a different regulation from the provisions of this notice, the Director General is authorised to issue their own measure that allows for a full adaptation of the notice to the aforementioned regulations.
